may have been done already. It may have been done one of these days. It is not a complicated procedure. I think it has been done. I am not sure.

Dr. Ram Subhag Singh: May I know_whether any prisoner has refused repatriation?

Shri Jawaharlal Nehru: In case of refusal, it was agreed that he be released where he is. He can do what he likes.

Mr. Speaker: The Question-hour is over.

*240. Shri H. N. Mukerjee: Will the Minister of Commerce and Industry be pleased to state the progress made by the automobile industry in respect of manufacture since the new policy declaration of Government on the automobile industry on the basis of the recommendations of the Tariff Commission?

The Minister of Commerce and In dustry (Shri T. T. Krishnamachari): The Government resolution on the Tariff Commission's report on the Automobile Industry was issued as recently as 31st May 1953. It will be too early now to review the progress made by the industry within this short time.
