

Loss due to Assam Agitation

401. SHRI M. V. CHANDRASHEKHARA MURTHY:

Will the Minister of HOME AFFAIRS be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that the country is losing Rs. 300 crores per month due to the prolonged Assam agitation;

(b) if so, whether Rs. 100 crores are by way of petroleum products and Rs. 200 crores indirectly through loss of essential items like fertilizer, cement and steel;

(c) the total loss suffered due to this upto now; and

(d) the steps taken by Government to overcome these losses?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS: (SHRI YOGENDRA MAKWANA): (a) to (d) The continuing agitation in Assam has disrupted non-main economic activity in particular in that State and in general in the rest of the country. Developmental activities not only in Assam but also in the North-Eastern region have received a serious setback. The three refineries in Assam were closed down towards the end of December 1979, followed by closure of Barauni refinery on 2nd January, 1980. Apart from other petroleum products, the daily loss of diesel and kerosene production in these four refineries has been about 5,000 tonnes and a little over 1,000 tonnes respectively. About 4,25,000 tonnes of crude are processed on an average every month in these four refineries. Through the refineries in Digbhoj and Gauhati have started functioning recently, the 3.3 million tonnes refinery at Barauni as well as the refinery at Bongaigon still

remain closed. When all the four refineries are closed, the loss is about Rs. 3 crores per day. Production in other vital sectors like fertilisers, steel, power and coal has also been affected. It is difficult to quantify the precise loss in this regard, which is however of considerable magnitude. The fall out of agitation has severely restricted new employment opportunities. The Government has been striving to bring about normalcy in the State.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS: (SHRI YOGENDRA MAKWANA): (a) to (d) The Report has been received by Delhi Administration and it is under examination by the Administration.

Performance of State Enterprises

(a) whether the Planning Commission has asked States to pay particular attention to the performance

of State enterprises especially the State Electricity Boards, Irrigation Development and the Transport Corporations;

(b) if so, whether the State Governments have also been asked to watch non-plan expenditure, improve receipts and also make efforts to raise more internal resources;

(c) whether it is also a fact that Planning Commission has indicated that Central assistance will not be very much during the Sixth Plan period, i.e. from 1980—85; and

(d) if so, what are the main reasons for this and the reaction of the State Governments?

THE MINISTER OF PLANNING (SHRI N. D. TEWARI): (a) and (b) Yes, Sir.

(c) The State Governments have been informed that attempts would be made to sustain the tempo of Central assistance for the States' Plans.

(d) Does not arise.

Formulation of Sixth Plan Proposals

Will the Minister of PLANNING be pleased to state:

(a) whether Planning Commission has asked the States to draft the Sixth Plan proposals;

(b) if so, whether any guidelines have been issued to the States for formulating the Plan;

(c) if so, whether the States have been urged to draft the proposals in such a way that they will have to make efforts to raise additional resources by themselves; and

(d) if so, how many States have so far prepared draft proposals and how

many have forwarded them to the Union Government?

THE MINISTER OF PLANNING (SHRI N. D. TEYARI): (a) Wes, Sir.

(b) Broad guidelines have been given to the State Governments for formulating their Plans.

(c) It has been suggested to the State Government *Inter-alia*, that increase in non-Plan expenditure may be kept in control, receipts improved and steps taken to raise more internal resources.

(d) Planning Commission have asked the States to furnish draft Plan proposals by end of September, 1980 for discussion.
