Will the **MINISTER of HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE** be pleased to state:

(a) whether the Government is implementing Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram in the country;

(b) if so, the details thereof along with the achievement made since its inception, year-wise;

(c) whether any evaluation has been done of the said scheme through social audit, if so, the details thereof;

(d) the number of children covered under the said scheme since the inception including the funds allocated/utilized during the last three years in the State of Odisha particularly in Kandhamal Parliamentary Constituency area, year-wise;

(e) whether the Government contemplates to set up advance diagnostic centres in Central Government Hospitals/Medical Centres for early diagnosis and treatment of pre-natal hereditary and other diseases; and

(f) if so, the details along with the funds allocated for this purpose thereof?

ANSWER THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (SMT. ANUPRIYA PATEL)

- a) Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) implements Rashtriya Bal Swasthaya Karyakram (RBSK) in all States/UTs under National Health Mission (NHM) for children in the age group 0-18 years in Anganwadi centres, Government and Government aided schools with the objective of early identification and management for 32 selected health conditions - 4 D's i.e. Defects at Birth, Developmental delays, Diseases and Deficiencies.
- b) As reported by States/UTs, 160.84 crore children have been screened, 11.90 crore children have been identified with selected health conditions and 5.63 crore children

have been provided secondary/tertiary care from FY 2014-15 till FY 2023-24 under RBSK. State/UT wise details is placed at Annexure-I.

- c) The RBSK Program is evaluated under NHM through review of quarterly reports, field visits and periodic meetings with State Nodal Officers, reviews during the process of Annual Programme Implementation Plans (APIP) and Common Review Missions (CRM).
- d) The technical and financial support is provided to the States/UTs under the NHM for infrastructure, essential equipment and required human resources at District Early Intervention centres (DEICs) including capacity building for comprehensive management of selected health conditions.

The details of the budget allocation and utilization for RBSK for the State of Odisha is placed at Annexure-II.

e) & (f)

As reported by the Department of Biotechnology, Unique Methods for Management of Inherited Disorders (UMMID) initiative was started by them to address the burden of genetic disorders in the country. One of the components of the UMMID initiative is establishing NIDAN Kendras (National Inherited Disorders Administration Kendras) for providing clinical care broadly encompassing the activities of prenatal testing for genetic disorders, newborn screening for relatively common treatable genetic metabolic disorders, and genetic counseling of pregnant mothers carrying fetuses with high risk of genetic disorders. Under this initiative, 26 NIDAN Kendras have been established at Government hospitals spread in 15 States/UTs of the country. The total amount allocated for the DBT-UMMID-NIDAN Kendras Initiative is approx. Rs.47.65 Crores.
