

Need for an inclusive education system in the country ? Laid

SHRI E. T. MOHAMMED BASHEER (MALAPPURAM): I wish to draw the attention of the Government towards serious concerns regarding the current state of our education system. There is a growing loss of credibility in our education, with a clear decline in academic standards and lack of critical thinking and creativity among students.

The shortage of teachers in both schools and colleges is affecting learning outcomes. There is a wide skill gap, and many students are not employable after completing their studies. I urge the Government to take urgent steps to address these issues, protect academic freedom, and ensure that our education system remains inclusive, unbiased, and future-ready.
