SHRI ANANT GANGARAM GEETE (RATNAGIRI) : Mr. Speaker, Sir, I am speaking on a very serious issue that the security provided to the Shivsena supremo Shri Balasaheb Thackrey has been withdrawn ... (Interruption). This is a serious issue... (Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Not now, please speak after question hour.

(Interruptions)

SHRI MOHAN RAWALE (MUMBAI SOUTH-CENTRAL): Sir, the Maharashtra Government has withdrawn the security provided to the Shiv Sena Supremo Shri Balasaheb Thackrey which is a serious issue...(Interruptions) Directives should be issued to the Maharashtra Government in this regard ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : After the question hour please, not now.

[Translation]

SHRI SURESH RAMRAO JADHAV (PARBHANI) : Sir, the security of Shri Balasaheb Thackrey should be restored, it is a serious issue ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Not now. Please take your seats.

(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Nothing will go on record.

(Interruptions)*

MR. SPEAKER : Hon. Members, please understand that this is Question Hour. There is a time to raise this matter.

This is not Zero hour. For how many days can you obstruct the Question Hour in the House ?

MR. SPEAKER : What is this ? This is not the time to raise your point.

(Interruptions)

SHRI MOHAN RAWALE : Sir, please let me speak for two minutes... (Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Please sit down now, speak after question Hour.

SHRI SURESH RAMRAO JADHAV : Sir, it is a very serious issue... (Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Not now, please sit down, speak later on.

(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I am appealing to all the Members to please take their seats. For how many days have you to lose the Question Hour ? Today is the sixth day. Please try to understand.

(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I am appealing to you that whatever points you have, you can raise them after the Question Hour, not now.

(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I think you do not want the Question Hour in this House.

SHRI ANANT GANGARAM GEETE : Hon'ble Speaker, Sir, security should be provided to Shri Bala Saheb Thackrey.

MR. SPEAKER : Are you not interested about the Question Hour ? Please tell me whether you are interested in Question Hour or not.

(Interruptions)

[Translation]

SHRI MOHAN RAWALE : Hon'ble, Speaker, Sir, Security must be provided to the Hindu leader and the Shiv Sena Supremo Shri Bała Saheb Thackrey ...(Interruptions)

[English]

MR. SPEAKER : Are you not interested about the Question Hour ? What is this ? Everyday you are doing like this.

(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I will allow you after the Question Hour. You can raise, after the Question Hour, whatever points you want to submit.

(Interruptions)

SHRI K.H. MUNIYAPPA (KOLAR) : Sir, it is a Constitutional matter. The Central Goverment is also concerned.(Interruptions)

THE MINISTER OF PARLIAMENTARY AFFAIRS AND MINISTER OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN) : Mr. Speaker, Sir, ...(Interruptions)

SHRI ANIL BASU (ARAMBAGH) : Sir, why has he been allowed ? ...(Interruptions)

SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN : Sir, I share the concern of the Members about the security of Shiv Sena Pramukh, Bala Saheb Thackrey. I will take up this matter with the hon. Home Minister and enquire with the State Government of Maharashtra as to what exactly has happened. But we wish that all kinds of security must be given to Shri Bala Saheb.(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I will allow you after that.

(Interruptions)

[Translation]

SHRI MOHAN RAWALE : Mr. Hon'ble Speaker, Sir, the Hon'ble Minister of the Parliamentary Affairs Shri Pramod Mahajan gave a statement just now and he has assured us that he will talk to the Hon'ble Home Minister in this regard and bring the issue relating to the security of Shiv Sena Supremo Shri Bala Saheb Thackrey to his notice. In this connection I would like to urge upon him to talk early to the hon'ble Home Minister and inform us. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Shri Madhavrao Scindia, what is your submission ?

(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I have allowed Shri Scindia. You please take your seat.

SHRI MADHAVRAO SCINDIA (GUNA) : Sir, this matter strikes at the very roots of our Constitution and it hits at the very roots of our parliamentary democracy. We have raised it by way of Adjournment Motion. Sir, you, in your wisdonm, disallowed it. ... (Interruptions) The Government requested and you requested for our co-operation. We co-operated. We ensured that the Railway Budget was undisturbed. We ensured that the General Budget was undisturbed. But everytime we fulfilled our part of the assurances. We are immediately roadrolled afterwards. You disallowed our Adjournment Motion. We accepted that. We have now requested for a discussion under Rule 184. ...(Interruptions) Government does not have to resign under Rule 184.

...(Interruptions) This issue is so fundamental that we want that one thousand million people of India should know where every individual and every Party stands on this particular issue in Parliament. And that can only be done through a vote and not through airy-fairy speeches or platitudes expressed in the House. Through a vote, let the people of India know where every individual, every Party stand. It should be through a concrete evidence of vote. ...(Interruptions) The Government is not threatened. Under Rule 184, the Government does not have to resign. ...(Interruptions) But why are they shying away? ...(Interruptions) Let the position of all the parties come in front of the people of India. ...(Interruptions) Therefore, this should be discussed under Rule 184. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I have not allowed you.

(Interruptions)

SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN) : Sir, according to the rules, you in your wisdom, ...(Interruptions)

[Translation]

SHRI VIJAY KUMAR GOEL (CHANDNI CHOWK) : Mr. Hon'ble Speaker, Sir, the hon'ble Member from opposition is wasting the time of the House. It seems to me that no other issue than this is left with my friends from Congress to raise in the House. If they want to raise this issue then they can raise this under the rule 193. ...(Interruptions)

SHRI MADHAVRAO SCINDIA : Sir, I would like to remind you that when Shri Narasimha Rao's Government was in a minority, four Adjournment Motions were admitted in spite of the fact that the Government was in a minority. If the Government loses an Adjournment Motion, Government has to resign. Even then four Adjournment Motions were admitted.

But now, you have overruled it. We have accepted it. But you must allow our request for discussion under Rule 184 so that the people of India know what is the position of every political Party in Parliament is on this very fundamental issue which strikes at the roots of our Constitution. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Shri Rupchand Pal, what is your submission ?

(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I have allowed Shri Rupchand Pal.

SHRI RUPCHAND PAL (HOOGHLY): Sir, we had given notice for discussion under Rule 184 so that we can discuss this R.S.S. issue here and the different political parties can spell out their viewpoints on this very very sensitive and vital national issue. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I allowed Shri Rupchand Pal.

SHRI RUPCHAND PAL : Sir, in the Rule book this provision of Rule 184 is there to discuss only such issues because this is a vital and sensitive issue and the whole nation is eagerly waiting to know the viewpoints of all the political parties and different representatives whom they have sent to this august House.

Sir, we have fulfilled our task. We have been responsible to respond to the request of this Government regarding presentation of the Budget. ...(Interruptions)

SHRI PRAKASH PARANJPE (THANE) : It has no bearing on the common man. ...(Interruptions) The issue of R.S.S. is not important for the common man. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I have not allowed you. You please take your seat.

SHRI RUPCHAND PAL : We have cooperated in the presentation of Railway Budget and In the presentation of the Union General Budget. We have always been extending our cooperation to the request of this Government and the Chair. The Government does not want to cooperate in running the House. The Government cannot wish away the Opposition of this House. ...(Interruptions)

[Translation]

SHRI PRAKASH PARANJPE : Mr. Hon'ble Speaker, Sir, these people are creating dramatic scenes. ...(Interruptions) Their names would appear in the newspapers. ...(Interruptions) We also have to ask something ...(Interruptions) We have to talk about budget. ...(Interruptions)

[English]

MR. SPEAKER : I have allowed him and not you. Please take your seat.

SHRI RUPCHAND PAL : The Government cannot wish away the Opposition of this House. The entire Opposition is present here and insisting on a discussion under Rule 184. Sir, we have given notices. ...(Interruptions)

SHRI MOHAN RAWALE : Mr. Hon'ble Speaker, Sir, Shri Madhavrao Scindia has asked the first question about the R.S.S. ...(Interruptions) The Government could have replied to that ...(Interruptions) on sixth they are organising a rally that is why they are politicising this issue.

MR. SPEAKER : This is not proper please. Hon. Members, please take your seats.

(Interruptions)

SHRI RUPCHAND PAL : We have been eagerly waiting for your permission of such a discussion under Rule 184, but this Government does not want to run this House and extend cooperation to you, Sir. ...(Interruptions) SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN : Sir, the Government consistently is taking a stand that we are ready to discuss any issue and every issue here. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I have allowed the hon. Minister. First, please listen to him. Let him complete please.

(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : I have allowed him. Let him complete.

SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN : Sir, he wants to speak, but he does not have the courage to listen to me. ...(Interruptions) That is his problem, Sir. ...(Interruptions)

SHRI MADHAVRAO SCINDIA : Sir, the people should know the stand taken by different parties. So, we want a discussion under Rule 184. ...(Interruptions)

SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN : Sir, if they want to know the position of different parties, it can be known in any discussion. Sir, you have allowed the discussion under Rule 193. The discussion has already been initiated and it should continue. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Shri Somnath Chatterjee.

DR. RAGHUVANSH PRASAD SINGH (VAISHALI) : Mr. Speaker, Sir, due to rigid attitude of the Government the business is not being taken up in the House. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Hon. Member, I have not allowed you. Please take your seat.

(Interruptions)

SHRI SOMNATH CHATTERJEE : Mr. Speaker, Sir. ...

DR. VIJAY KUMAR MALHOTRA (SOUTH DELHI) : Mr. Speaker, Sir, none has allowed Pramod Mahajanji to speak here. ...(Interruptions) Now when he wants to speak he expects us to maintain silence. ...(Interruptions) Let the member of our party may also be allowed to speak here. ...(Interruptions)

Let him make his point. ... (Interruptions)

[Translation]

SHRI SOMNATH CHATTERJEE : You can speak I will speak afterwards. ...(Interruptions)

[English]

SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN : Sir, for the last (Interruptions)

[Translation]

SHRI RASHID ALVI (AMROHA) : He is not listening to us and is presenting only his viewpoint. ...(Interruptions) Please listen to our view point also. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Please take your seat.

(Interruptions)

[English]

SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN : Sir, on the day one when this issue came under Adjournment Motion, you, in your wisdom, had disallowed the Adjournment Motion under Rule 56.

Then, the Opposition took a stand that this should be discussed under Rule 184, and the Government took a stand that the Central Government has no role in the decision taken by the Gujarat Government.

SOME HON. MEMBERS : No.

MR. SPEAKER : Shri Munsi, please let him complete.

(Interruptions)

[Translation]

KUNWAR AKHILESH SINGH (MAHARAJGANJ, U.P.) : The Government of Gujarat has allowed Government employees to participate in R.S.S. activities. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Hon. Member, I have not allowed you.

SHRI PRAMOD MAHAJAN : The Government of India has repeatedly made it crystal clear that as far as the Government of India is concerned, we are not allowing the employees of the Government of India to take part in RSS activities. As far as the role of the Government of India is concerned, we made our position crystal clear....(Interupptions)

SHRI MADHAVRAO SCINDIA : If he is opening this issue, then our arguments also will have to go on record. From the Government side, he wanted to know why we wanted to discuss it under Rule 184. We told him as to why we want to discuss it under Rule 184.

The discussion has already started in the House, and the speech of Shri Kirlt Somalya is incomplete. So, the Opposition is unnecessarily taking the precious time of the House in disrupting the proceedings. I request the Opposition to allow the discussion under Rule 193, which has already been started in the House. There is no question of turning it into a discussion under Rule 184. ... (Interruptions)

SHRI SOMNATH CHATTERJEE : Mr. Speaker, Sir, the intervention of the hon. Minister for Parliamentary Affairs. ...(Interruptions)

SHRI VIJAY GOEL : Mr. Speaker, Sir, how business of the House can be conduct in this way. How come that other Members are asked to maintain silence where Somnathji speaks. ...(Interruptions)

MR. SPEAKER : Please understand that he is a senior Member. What is this ?

SHRI SOMNATH CHATTERJEE : We listened to your viewpoint. ...(Interruptions)

Earnings by Indian Airlines

*101. SHRIMATI SHEELA GAUTAM :

SHRI SHIVRAJ SINGH CHOUHAN :

Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) the total number of passengers and the quantum of luggage brought through international flights by the Indian Airlines in the country during 1998-99 and 1999-2000;

(b) the total revenue earned by it;

(c) whether the Indian Airlines is competing satisfactorily with other International Airlines;

- (d) if so, the details thereof;
- (e) if not, the reasons therefor; and

(f) the measures taken by the Government in this regard ?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) and (b) The total number of passengers and the quantum of luggage (free and excess baggage) brought through international flights of Indian Airlines, and the details of revenue earned thereon, are as under :

(c) and (d) Yes, Sir. Market share of passengers carried by Indian Airlines on the routes where it is operating international flights has increased from 23.1% during 1998-99 to 26.1% during 1999-2000 (upto 31st December, 1999).

(e) and (f) Do not arise.

Theft of Luggage

*102 SHRI RAM TAHAL CHAUDHARY : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to State :

(a) whether theft of luggage is being committed in trains and at various Railway Stations very frequently;

(b) if so, the details thereof and the compensation paid during each of the last two year, zone-wise;

(c) the number of railway officials against whom action has been taken in this regard zone-wise; and

(d) the steps taken/to be taken to prevent such type of crimes in future ?

THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS (KUMARI MAMATA BANERJEE): (a) Yes Sir. However, "Policing" being a State subject, the safety and security of passengers and their belongings in the running trains and railway premises is the Constitutional responsibility of the State Government concerned which they discharge through their Government Railway Police (GRP). The cases of crimes on railways are reported to, registered and investigated by the Government Railway Police (GRP).

(b) The information as collected through the Chief Security Commissioners/Railway Protection Force (RPF) of Zonal Railways from the concerned GRP authorities is given in the statement. No compensation is paid on theft of luggage

in passenger's charge whether at Station or on Train. However, Railway officials supplement the efforts of GRP in recovery of stolen personal luggage of passengers; and in many cases such stolen items have been restored to their rightful owners.

(c) Although the responsibility for prevention and detection of theft of luggage personally carried by passengers, is that of State Government concerned, action is initiated against Railway Officials concerned whenever specific charges of dereliction of duty in such cases are brought against them, keeping in view the overall interest of safety and security of passengers. The details of such action initiated is being collected and will be laid on the Table of the House.

(d) In addition to various measure being taken by the GRP to improve the safety and security of the passengers, the Railway administration is taking the following steps to assist GRP :

- 1. A meeting of Chief Secretaries and Director General of States was convened recently by Minister for Railways. A high level joint Committee of Railways and State Government Officials has been set up to suggest ways and means to improve effectiveness of GRP and RPF in preventing crimes in trains and Railway premises.
- 2. Anti-social elements are being removed from Railway premises and trains by RPF.
- Proper watch is being kept by Coach Attendants/ TTEs on the passengers entering/detraining from the coaches and the coaches are property locked during their run especially in night hours.
- 4. FIR forms are made availabe with the Train Guards/ Stations Masters/RPF to facilitate the travelling public to lodge their reports immediately.
- 5. Sharing of Special Intelligence and Crime Intelligence between RPF and GRP is being done at ail levels.
- 6. Announcement through Public Address system and CCTV at important Railway Stations to alert the travelling passengers against theft of their belongings etc.
- RPF Assistance posts are provided at important stations to assist passengers in lodging FIRs with Government Railway Police etc.
- Periodic High Level co-orcination Meetings with Government Railway Police and Local Police are being conducted to analyse the crime position on Railways with a view to take suitable preventive measures.
- 9. Wherever the State Government wants to establish mobile post in the running trains, necessary facilities like accommodation etc. are being provided.

Output of Ordnance Factories

*103 SHRIMATI RANEE NARAH :

SHRI VILAS MUTTEMWAR :

Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether Ordnance Factories had worked overtime to double the output during the Kargll crisis;

(b) if so, the normal output of each of these factories and extent to which it has been increased;

(c) whether these Ordnance Factories have started working continuously to fill up the gap of the arms and ammunitions that were exhausted during the Kargil conflict; and

(d) if so, the extent to which the Ordance Factories have restored their original position of production of arms and ammunitions ?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FERNANDES): (a) to (d) Defence forces projected enhanced requirement of selected items of ammunition, cables and clothing on Ordnance Factories during Kargil operation. In order to meet the enhanced requirement, concerned Ordnance Factories (OFs) resorted to working over-time and also redeployed the work force. Output of these items consequently increased substantially during 1999-2000 and is expected to be higher than that in 1998-99 by 33% to 900% for ammunition items, 20% to 108% for clothing items and by 76% to 233% for cables. As a result of this, the overall value of issues of Ordnance Factories to Defence Services is expected to increase by 35.65% during 1999-2000 as compared to the value of issue in 1998-99.

The production level of OFs reached during 1999-2000 will be broadly sustained during the next financial year to take care of the requirement of the Defence forces.

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV): (a) Yes, Sir. A Committee headed by Shri M.C. Misra, the then Director General, Border Security Force was set-up in 1985.

(b) The major recommendations made by the Committee are as under :

- Setting up of a Central Aviation Security Police for performing security and anti-hijacking functions at the airports.
- Setting up of a Central Aviation Security Directorate under the Ministry of Civil Aviation to deal with all matters pertaining to civil aviation security.
- (iii) Setting up of Bomb Detection and Disposal Squads (BDDS) at International and other sensitive airports.
- (iv) Imparting basic and refresher training to airport security personnel, airlines staff and other agencies functioning at airports.

(c) The recommendations made by the Committee were considered by the Govt. and the action taken thereon are as under :

- (i) Due to financial constraints, it has not been possible to set up a Central Aviation Security Police. However, after the incident of hijacking of IC-814, it has been decided to deploy Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) personnel in place of the State Police for security duties at all operational domestic airports in the first phase. CISF has already taken over the security duties at Jaipur, Guwahati, Vadodara and Port Blair airports.
- (ii) A separate Attached Office called Bureau of Civil

Aviation Security (BCAS) under the Ministry of Civil Aviation has been set up.

- (iii) Bomb Detection and Disposal Squads have been set up at Delhi, Mumbai, Calcutta, Chennai and Srinagar airports.
- (iv) Regular training programmes for training of airport security personnel, airlines staff, etc. are being organised by BCAS.

Voluntary Retirement Scheme in Indian Airlines and Air India

*105. SHRI P.R. KHUNTE : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Indian Airlines and Air India are pressurising their employees to go on long leave and opt for valuntary retirement;

(b) if so, the reasons therefor and the details of schemes formulated in this regard;

(c) whether any concrete steps have taken to strengthen the financial condition of Indian Airlines and Air India; and

(d) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) (a) : No, Sir.

(b) Does not arise.

(c) and (d) Air India has taken following steps to improve its financial performance :

(i) Marketing efforts have been stepped up to generate additional revenue; (ii) Network rationalization and consolidation with emphasis placed on route profitability; (iii) Reduction in expenditure on outside repairs of aircraft by undertaking more in-house repairs; (iv) Several posts of India based officers abroad have been abolished; (v) Freeze on external recruitment in non-operational categories; (vI) Two voluntary schemes have been notified viz. shorter working week scheme and leave without pay/allowances scheme for a period of two years extendable upto five years; (vii) Rolling back of retirement age from 60 to 58 years; (viii) Introduction of Automated Revenue yield Management Systems (ARMS) and curtailment of advertisement and publicity budget.

For improvement of its financial position further, Indian Airlines has also taken various steps such as increased utilisation of aircraft, deployment of capacity on the criteria of economics and traffic demand, marketing initiatives, improvement in customer services and various cost cutting measures to reduce expenditure such as freeze on capital expendicture etc.

Implementation of Rural Development Programmes

*106 SHRI KODIKUNNIL SURESH : Will the Minister of RURAL DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government have issued fresh guidelines to the State Governments for effective implementation and proper monitoring of various Rural Development Programmes;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the details of findings of various impact assessment studies and concurrent evaluation ?

THE MINISTER OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT (SHRI SUNDAR LAL PATWA): (a) and (b) The guidelines for various programmes, including the guidelines issued during the year, 1999-2000 for the restructured programmes such as Swamjayanti Gram Swarozgar Yojana, Employment Assurance Scheme and Jawahar Gram Samridhi Yojana contained provisions for implementation, monitoring and evaluation. These are in the nature of prescription of periodic reports; coordination mechanism of Swarnjayanti Gram Swarozgar Yojana in the form of Block/District/State-level SGSY Committees; and schedules for inspection of works. In addition, this Ministry has also issued guidelines for constitution of Vigilance and Monitoring Committees at the State, District and Block levels, which meet periodically to review the implementation of different programmes.

(c) During the last five years, the Ministry has undertaken concurrent evaluation (CE) of the Integrated Rural Development Programme (IRDP), the Indian Awaas Yojana (IAY) and the Million Wells Scheme (MWS) and has also conducted Nine Impact Assessment Studies. While the reports of CE of the IAY and the MWS are being finalised, the major findings of CE of the IRDP and the Impact Assessment Studies are contained in the statement enclosed.

Statement

Major findings of concurrent Evaluation of Integrated Rural Development Programme (IRDP) conducted during 1995-96.

- 1. 72.80% beneficiaries (old and new both) in the primary sector, 78.81% in the secondary sector and 71.82% in the tertiary sector reported the assistance (subsidy plus loan) for purchase of assets as adequate.
- The average net income of old beneficiaries from IRDP assets was reported to be Rs. 2498/- for all sectors taken together and was Rs. 3328/- for tertiary sector and Rs. 1903/- for primary sector.
- 3. 94.47% of the old beneficiaries who were productively using the assets reported that their quality was very good or fair.
- 4. 87.38% of the new beneficiaries reported the asset to be in productive use.
- 5. 84.96% of old beneficiaries crossed earlier poverty line of Rs. 6400/- while 46.34% of them crossed the revised poverty line of Rs. 11000/.
- 6. 82.85% of SC old beneficiaries crosed earlier poverty

line of Rs. 6400/- while 39.12% of them crossed the revised poverty line of Rs. 11000/.

- 83.06% of ST old beneficiaries crossed earlier poverty line of Rs. 6400/- while 33.65% of them crossed the revised poverty line of Rs. 11000/.
- 8. About 40% of the households identified below poverty line in the BPL survey are from Scheduled Castes (SC) (22.35%) and Scheduled Tribes (ST) (17.37%) categories.
- Only 26.36% of the beneficiaries were selected by Gram Sabha whereas 55.74% of the beneficiaries were selected by village/block officials.
- 10. 21.64% of old and new families reported that school age going children working to support the family.

Impact Assessment Studies

Major findings of the Impact Assessment studies are given Below :

- 1. Majority of the recipient of assistance for creating assets was earning viable income from the scheme.
- 2. Increment in employment days and income had resulted in better quantity of meal.
- 3. Shortage of personel and resources is a major hurdle in implementation of programmes.
- 4. The target group enjoys better standard of living in the villages which indicates that impact of these programmes has been favourable in the past in raising the standard of living of the poor people.
- 5. Transparency in selection of beneficiaries, maintenance of records, and maintenance of databases needs improvement.
- 6. Despite many problems, the poverty alleviation programmes had definitely made an impact. All stakeholders had reported that although piecemeal, the villages had certainly progressed in the past three years, especially due to the creation of community assets like roads, water points, essential buildings like the school, etc. There were reports of increasing affordability for basic necessities and other household expenses. In many cases, the additional income had been diverted to the education of the children. Beneficiaries from the MWS had reported increasing productivity of crops and a rise in agricultural income.
- 7. Under NOAPS most of the beneficiaries received benefits.43 per cent of the beneficiaries were women. 40 per cent of the beneficiaries under the scheme said that the pension is not paid regularly.
- 8. There is a need to have professional and realistic approach for identification of viable projects, be it for the beneficiaries or for the village.
- 9. Beneficiaries specially under IRDP and DWCRA find

it very difficult to market the products manufactured by them. This is due to lack of quality of the product being manufactured. There is need to adopt appropriate technology to suit rural entrepreneurs and create awareness among the beneficiaries regarding the importance of maintaining the quality.

 Most of the projects identified under the various programmes suffer mainly due to unscientific way of fixing the project cost.

Training to Pilots and Crew Members to Deal with Hijackers

*107. SHRI AVTAR SINGH BHADANA : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether any serious thought has been given by the Government to provide special training to pilots and other crew members, keeping in view the hijacking of planes;

(b) whether Government have invited the suggestions of the retired pliots or appointed any High Level Committee in this regard; and

(c) if so, the details regarding the steps the Government have taken to deal with the hijacking of planes ?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) No, Sir. However, Government has an open mind and welcomes suggestions in this regard from all quarters.

(c) The following measures have been taken for the safety of air passengers:

- (i) Deployment of Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) personnel of place of State Police for security duties at the operational airports in a phased manner. The CISF has already taken over the security duties at Patna, Jaipur, Guwahati, Vadodara and Port Blair airports.
- (ii) Frisking of passengers and hand baggage at the time of entry into sterile area has been tightened. Ladder point secondary frisking has been introduced.
- (iii) Strict control on access to the airports is being ensured by comprehensive review of photo-identity cards to restrict the number of pass holders and banning of entry of the visitors upto 31.3.2000.
- (iv) Deployment of sky marshals on flights at random basis as an added safety precuation.
- (v) Raising of the perimeter wall to the prescribed height at all the operational airports.
- (vi) Replacement of old X-Ray machines and installation of new colour X-Ray machines wherever necessary so as to ensure that at least 2 X-Ray machines are available at every point.
- (vii) Modernisation and upgradation of security related technological set up of the airports is being done in a phased manner.

Development of Airports in North-Eastern States

*108. SHRI BHIM DAHAL : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether the air facilities in North-Eastern States are very poor;

(b) if so, the facts thereof;

(c) whether there is any proposal with the Government for the development of the existing airports and setting up of new airports in the North-Eastern States;

(d) if so, the details thereof;

(e) the time by which the work is expected to be completed; and

(f) the total expenditure involved in these projects ?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV): (a) to (f) Upgradation of facilities at airports is a continuing process in keeping with the demand from scheduled airlines and availability of resources. During the Ninth Five Year Plan, Airports Authority of India (AAI) has undertaken upgradation of Agartala, Dibrugarh, Dimapur, Guwahati, Imphal, Jorhat, Lilabari, Silchar, Shillong (Barapani), Tezpur airports at an approximate cost of Rs. 379 crores.

- 2. There is a proposal to construct an airport near Itanagar in Arunachal Pradesh suitable for 50 seater aircraft at an estimated cost of Rs. 50 crores. The site is being finalised in consultation with State Government.
- 3. An airport at Tura in Meghalaya for 20 seater aircraft is under construction at an estimated cost of Rs. 12.21 crores. The probable date of completion is December, 2000.
- 4. A new airport at Lengpui in Mizoram has been constructed at an estimated cost of Rs. 97.50 crores and made operational in December, 1998. The terminal building is expected to be completed by December, 2000.

Accumulation of Spare Parts in Defence Warehouses

*109. PROF. R.R. PRAMANIK : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether the spare parts worth crores of rupees are accumulated in defence warehouses;

(b) if so, the details of such spare parts, their value and their origin;

(c) the amount derived out of the sale of these spare parts; and

(d) the steps taken to ensure that the stock of spare parts is used first before ordering for fresh lots?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FERNANDES) : (a) to (d) The Armed Forces, Ordnance

Factories and the Defence Public Sector Undertakings carry a large inventory of spares and components running into several lakh categoreis for the diverse range of equipment, weapons and weapon systems. While these stock of spares are required for meeting the requirements of the Armed Forces for maintenance of the equipment and their repair and overhaul, a fair number of spares also remain in stock as 'insurace' spares. By their very concept, insurance spares like gear boxes, propellers and shafts are specific to a platform/ship which if the contingency of the breakdown does not arise during its life time, would automatically become surplus. The inventory of spares held in the Armed Forces is, need based, as the requirement of spares for Armed Forces in worked out in a scientific manner. through the Annual Provisioning Reviews after taking into account the recommendations of the manufactures, consumption/movement pattern of spares, existing stocks, dues in and other relevant factors. However, even a minor variation in the consumption pattern is likely to result in some over or under provisioning, notwithstanding the most scientific provisioning exercise. Such deviations in consumption pattern are taken into account in the next provisioning Reviews. However, some spares which account for a fraction of the total inventory are declared surplus to the requirements of the Services at the end of their shelf/technical life or on account of technology obsolescence and are disposed of accordingly.

The Army has undertaken the "Computerised Inventory Control Project", a pilot project for online inventory system to computerise its inventory. The Navy has automated its entire procurement process through the creation of a Wide Area Network (WAN) — Integrated Logistics Management Systems (ILMS). Similarly the Indian Air Force has initiated Project 'Inventory Material Management On-Line (IMMOLS)'. On completion of these projects, the Defence Services would have computerised the entire inventory of spares with the attendant economies and efficiency.

Recomendations of Khanna Committee

*110. SHRI VAIKO : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether the report on railway safety has been presented by Justice Khanna Committee;

(b) if so, whether the Commission has recommended the upgradation of signals, telecommunications and track maintenance;

(c) if so, the amount required to meet the safety norms;

(d) the manner in which the funds are proposed to be generated; and

(e) the steps taken by the Government to implement the safety norms as recommended by the Khanna Committee?

THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS (KUMARI MAMTA BANERJEE) : (a) Yes, Sir. The Railway Safety Review Committee set up under the chairmanship of Justice H.R. Khanna, a retired Judge of Supreme Court, has submitted Part-I of their report. Part-II of their report is yet to be received. The Part-I of the report (both English and Hindi versions) will be laid in Lok Sabha during the current session.

(b) to (d) In Part-I of the report, the Committee has made 150 recommendations on different aspects of railway working. The committee has recommended provision of technical aids costing Rs. 2727 crores and renewal of assets costing Rs. 15,000 crores, besides other recommendations for which no financial repercussions have been given. The provision of technical aids and renewal of assets includes signalling, telecommunication and track maintenance.

It has also been suggested by the Committee that Central Government should provide a one time grant of Rs. 15,000 crores to the Railways so that arrears in renewals of vital safety equipment are wiped out within a fixed time frame. The provision of safety equipment/systems will depend upon the availability of funds either through grant from the Central Government or by means of internal generation of resources by Railway.

(e) Although, Indian Railways have not received any specific grants on the basis of the recommendations of the Railway Safety Review Committee, efforts have been made to suitably enhance the outlay of safety related items in the next years budget within the constraints of available resources.

The budget proposals for 2000-2001 presented before Lok Sabha on 25th February carry a proposed outlay of Rs. 2,000 crore on track renewals, which is about 27% higher than the revised outlay during the current year. Similarly, signals and telecommunications, another safety item carries a proposed outlay, which is about 26% higher than the revised outlay in the current year. Action on implementing the recommendations of the Railway Safety Review Committee will continue to be taken depending on availability of resources with due priority.

Estimated Profits of AIR India

*111. SHRI MADHAVRAO SCINDIA :

SHRI SUSHIL KUMAR SHINDE :

Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) the projected growth of air traffic, passenger and cargo of Air India for the year 2000-2001;

(b) actual physical and fiscal achievement of air traffic made by the Air India during the current year;

(c) the measures being adopted for achieving the projected growth; and

(d) the estimated profit/loss to be incurred by Air India during 1999-2000 and the contemplated profit and other targets for 2000-2001?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) The emphasis in years 2000-2001 is on improvement and rationalisation of its operation, generating greater efficiencies and increasing over all load factor. (b) During the April/November, 1999 period. Air India achieved a passenger load factor of 68.8% and an over all load factor of 63.8%. It incurred a loss of Rs. 44.93 crores.

(c) The measures being adopted for achieving the projected growth are as under :

- Redeployment of capacity on more profitable routes.
- An increase in the seating capacity of the B747-400 aircraft by adding more Economy class seats.
- Reduction in staff strength in India and abroad through rollback of retirement age of 58 years and implementation of schemes such as Shorter Working Week, Leave without pay, Staff, redeployment to operational areas etc.
- Disinvesting its holding in the wholly owned subsidiary Hotel Corporation of India Limited.
- Selling its surplus and ageing B747-200 aircraft.
- Introduction of Automated Revenue Management Systems (ARMS) and curtailment of advertisement and publicity budget.

(d) As per the revised budget estimate for the year 1999/2000, Al's net loss is estimated to be Rs 146.18 crores (Prov.). Budget estimates for 2000-2001 are yet to be finalised by Air India management.

Implementation of Safety Measures

*112 SHRI Y.S. VIVEKANANDA REDDY : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Comptroller & Auditor General of India has pointed out that proposals regarding safety measures remain on paper;

(b) if so, whether according to his observation, status of four important aids identified by various committees over the past 20 years has not been fully implemented so far;

(c) if so, the reason therefor;

(d) the officials held responsible for not implementing these four important safety measures; and

(e) the action taken against guilty officials ?

THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS (KUMARI MAMATA BANERJEE): (a) and (b) Although the Comptroller & Auditor General of India in his Report No. 9 of 1999 has pointed out that 4 important safety aids have not been fully implemented, the CAG has not stated in his Report that the safety measures remain on paper.

(c) to (e) Introduction of safety equipment is a time consuming process. Fool proof, pilfer-proof and time-tested technology is first tried out on a limited scale on trail basis. After field trials are found to be successful, the equipment/technology are cleared for implementation. Depending upon availability of funds and inter-se-priority, these projects are implemented progressively. However, special thrust has been given to Track Circuiting, Auxiliary Warning System, Train Actuated Warning Devices and Train Radio Communication. Safety is the end product of combined efforts made by all constituent departments involved in train operations. No individual responsibility can be fixed for delay in introduction of safety equipment.

(b) the cost overrum in respect of the projects running behind their respective targetted time schedule, project-wise; and

(c) the present position of the above projects, Projectwise

THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS (KUMAR MAMATA BANERJEE) : (a) to (c) Targets for completion of rail projects are fixed on an annual basis based on availability of resources. Details of the projects targeted for completion in current year (1999-2000), are as follows:

Security Officer at Kathmandu Airport

Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state:

(a) whether the Government have decided to impress upon Nepal Government to permit Indian Airlines to depute on duty a security officer at Kathmandu Airport for supervising its flight arrangements etc.;

(b) if so, whether the Government have received any positive response from the Nepal Government in this regard; and

(c) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV): (a) Yes, sir.

(b) and (c) His Majesty's Government of Nepal have assured the Government of India that they are taking measures to enhance security at the Tribhuvan International Airport on a priority basis.

Acquisition of Advanced Jet Trainer

*115. SHRI SULTAN SALAHUDDIN OWAISI: Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state:

(a) Whether attention of the Government has been drawn to the News-item captioned "MPs cry foul over proposed AJT deal" appearing in the 'Hindustan Times', dated January 20, 2000;

(b) if so, whether the Government have since considered the suggestions made by some Members of Parliament in regard thereto; and

(c) if so, the details thereof and if not, the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FERNANDES) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) and (c) Government have considered the suggestions made by some Members of Parliament. A presentation has since been made to the Standing Committee on Defence on the present status of the programme of induction of Advanced Jet Trainer (AJT). The Hon'ble Members have been apprised that the Indian Air Force has carried out technical appraisal of the various AJTs available and have found Hawk of United Kingdom and Alpha Jet of France the most suitable options to meet the requirements of the IAF.

Mobilisation of Funds

*116. SHRI ANNASAHEB M.K.PATIL: Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state:

(a) whether the Government have announced several major policy decisions on the eve of new millennium ?

(b) if so, the details thereof along with financial implications thereof; and

(c) the rate of return on several on-going major projects which are languishing in implementation for want of financial support and the policy of the Government in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS (KUMARI MAMATA BANERJEE): (a) and (b) Yes, Sir. The details are available in the Budget Document tabled on the floor of the House.

(c) Railways have two types of projects under implementation. First, those which are required for enhancing commercial prospects of Railways and second, those projects which are desirable in the interest of social and economic development of the country. While in case of first category of projects, rate of return is usually high, in respect of those of category two, rate of return is often very low or negative. Indian Railways do not run strictly on commercial terms and, therefore, the projects with low or negative rate of return also have to be accommodated and executed in phases based on availability of resources on year to year basis in the interest of rural, remote, and backward areas.

Within the constraints of availability of financial resources, Railways make best efforts to progress all the on-going projects. However, the pace of progress of various projects vary on the basis of various technical, non-technical, and logistical factors, including funds constraints.

Fencing of Railway Lines

*117 SHRIMATI D.M. VIJAYA KUMARI Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state:

(a) whether the work of barbed wire fencing of Railway passing through sensitive areas like Jammu to Punjab, Rajasthan and Assam is proposed to be undertaken to prevent/counter terrorist attacks;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the time by which a final decision is likely to be taken in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS (KUMARI MAMATA BANERJEE): (a) and (b) State Government of Jammu & Kashmir had asked Railways to examine possibility of providing fencing on both sides of Railway track from Jummu to Ghagwal for security reasons. Proposal to provide this fencing at an estimated cost of Rs. 12.90 crores has been sent to J & K Govt. for their acceptance. As regards the fencing of Railway lines in Punjab, Rajasthan and Assam, there is no such proposal at present.

(c) Work will be taken up from Jammu to Ghagwal after it is sanctioned by J&K Govt. and necessary funds provided by them.

Tourism Offices Abroad

Will the Minister of TOURISM be pleased to state:

(a) the amount paid by way of salary, allowances etc. to the employees and the miscellaneous expenditure incurred on the tourist offices located in foreign countries; and

(b) the performance of these offices in attracting foreign tourists vis-a-vis their expenditure?

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND CULTURE (SHRI ANANTH KUMAR): (a) During the financial years 1997-98 and 1998-99 the expenditure by way of salaries etc. incurred on Government of India Tourist Offices overseas is mentioned below:

Recommendations of National Security Council/ Advisory Board

*119. SHRI KAMAL NATH:

DR. V. SAROJA:

Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state:

(a) the composition and functions of the National Security Council and its Advisory Board alongwith their terms of reference separately;

(b) whether the Board has recommended an increase in country's defence budget;

(c) if so, the extent of increase recommended and accepted;

(d) the number of meetings held by the Council and the Board since their inception;

(e) the broad outlines of the suggestions made therein separately; and

(f) the follow-up action taken thereon?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FERNANDES): (a) to (f) The National Security Council was formally set up on April 16,1999. It consists of the Prime Minister as the Chairman and Ministers of Home Affairs, Defence, External Affairs, Finance and the Deputy Chairman, Planning Commission as its Members.

> 2. The National Security Council advises the Goverment on external security environment and threat

scenario; security threats involving atomic energy, space and high technology; trends in the world economy and economic security threats in the areas of energy, foreign trade, food, finance and ecology; internal security, including counter-insurgency, counter-terrorism and counter-intelligence; patterns of alienation emerging in the country, especially those with a social, communal or regional dimension; security threats posed by trans-border crimes such as smuggling and traffic in arms, drugs and narcotics; and co-ordination in intelligence collection and tasking of intelligence agencies so as to ensure that intelligence is focussed on areas of concern for the nation.

- 3. The National Security Advisory Board (NSAB) consists of a Convenor and other persons of eminence outside the Government with expertise in the fields of foreign affairs, external security, defence and Armed Forces, strategic analysis, economics, science and technology, internal security, and related areas. The Board advises the Council on such issues relating to national security that may be referred to it by the Council.
- 4. The Members of the National Security Advisory Board interacted with the Prime Minister in a meeting held on 8.6.1999 at which members of the National Security Council and the Strategic Policy Group were also present. The NSAB had thirteen plenary sessions and its subgroups held nearly eighty meetings. In addition, the NSAB interacted with a number of experts in separate meetings. Two documents relating to a Draft Paper for India's nuclear Doctrine and a Strategic Defence Review were produced by the NSAB.
- 5. The National Security Council and its sub-structures provide an effective channel for integrated thinking and coordinated application of political, military, diplomatic, scientific and technological resources of the State to protect and promote national security goals and objectives. As part of the Strategic Defence Review, the NSAB also recognised the necessity of enhancing the defence expenditure while keeping it at a level which the economy can sustain.
- 6. The inputs generated through the NSC and its substructures as a result of inter-Ministerial coordination and integration of views from both within the Government and experts outside the Government are taken into account while formulating National security policies and making budgetary allocations for Defence by the Government.

Occupancy Rate in Hotels

*120. SHRI SUBODH MOHITE: Will the Minister of TOURISM be pleased to state:

(a) whether the I.T.D.C. hotels registered low occupancy rate for third year in succession;

(b) if so, the reasons therefor;

(c) whether the ITDC proposes to sell some of its hotels to private sector;

(d) if so, the details thereof; and

(e) response received from the private sector in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND MINISTER OF CULTURE (SHRI ANANTH KUMAR): (a) and (b) Yes, Sir. The Annual occupancy of ITDC hotels has gone down from 49% during 1996-97 to 37% in 1998-99. This is mainly due to:

(i) Decline in Business Tourist Traffic.

- (ii) Devaluation of currency of Far-East countries making that destination cheaper.
- (iii) Price under-cutting by private sector.

(c) to (e) The main recommendations of the Disinvestment Commission are as under:

- (i) Hotels situated in prime locations like Delhi and Bangalore may be handed over to established hotel chains through a competitive bidding process to be run on a long term structured contract on lease-cummanagement basis.
- (ii) Other hotels may be de-merged into separate corporate identities and the disinvestment in the new companies will be through sale of 100% Government shareholdings in them.

The Government has accepted the recommendations of the Commission.

Purchasing of Items from Manufacturers

1117. SHRI RAMSAGAR RAWAT: Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to refer to the answer given on December 23, 1999 to Unstarred Question No. 3586 and state the reasons, the NCCF has failed to make purchases from the manufacturers of repute despite directions from the Department of Personnel and Training and their assurance to review of existing procedure of purchases?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : The NCCF is an autonomous cooperative organization having its own Board of Directors to take decision on the business and administrative matters. The Government of India do not interfere in such matters. The NCCF has, however, informed that they are purchasing most of the branded items from the manufacturers/distributors. Only such items, for which the NCCF does not have any arrangement with the manufacturers/distributors, are purchased from suppliers registered with NCCF after ensuring their rates and quality. The NCCF has further informed that supply arrangement made by them is reviewed periodically and corrective steps, wherever necessary, are taken to ensure supply of quality goods at competitive prices.

Contract for Transportation of New Army Vehicles

1118. SHRIMATI JAYASHREE BANERJEE: Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state:

(a) whether contract is awarded for transportation of new army vehicles;

(b) if so, the amount of contract spent during the last three years;

(c) whether the Army has shortage of drivers which result in awarding contracts of transportation; and

(d) If so, the details thereof and steps taken by the Government in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FERNANDES): (a) to (d) The Army vehicles are being procured from the three sources viz. Ordnance Factory Board (OFB), Bharat Earth Movers Ltd. (BEML) and Trade (Private Sector). Vehicles from all the sources are required to be transported to the consignee depots by the suppliers.

Vehicles from private vendors are transported under their own arrangements as per the terms and conditions of the contracts to the consignee depots.

The vehicles from BEML are transported to the consignee depots on Military Credit Note (MCN) by Rail. In case of OFB, majority of the vehicles are transported by Rail on Military Credit Note, while some vehicles are also transported by road under arrangements of the OFB.

In view of above, Army drivers are not utilised for the purpose.

Imported Diesel Locomotives

1120. SHRI MOHAN RAWALE: Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state:

(a) Whether imported diesel locomotives have joined the fleet of Indian Railways in the recent past; and

(b) if so, the number thereof and the cost of each loco?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH):(a) Yes, Sir.

(b) 21 nos. of diesel locomotives (13 fully assembled and 8 in partially knocked down condition) were imported from M/s General Motors/USA at an average FOB cost of US\$ 1894170.00 (Rs. 8.10 crores) for each loco.

Development of Tourism in Chandigarh

1121. SHRI PAWAN KUMAR BANSAL : Will the Minister of TOURISM be pleased to state:

(a) whether Chandigarh has a great potential for development as a major tourist place; and

(b) if so, the steps proposed to be taken in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND MINISTER OF CULTURE (SHRI ANANTH KUMAR): (a) and (b) Development of tourism in places of tourist importance is primarity undertaken by the State/U.T. Governments. However, Ministry of Tourism strengthens their efforts by providing financial assistance for projects/schemes prioritised in consultation with them. Accordingly, for the year 1999-2000, 8 projects/schemes for an amount of Rs. 282.00 lakhs have been identified for development of Tourism in Chandigarh.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) to (c) The offtake of edible oils by the State Governments for distribution under the Public Distribution System, has come down over the last few months. The STC has a stock of 35565 tonnes as on 24th February, 2000. This is held on Government account. Government is closely monitoring the prices and availability of edible oils in the country, for which purpose their import has been undertaken by Government through STC.

Sick Sugar Factories

(a) whether a large number of sugar factories are sick in the country;

(b) if so, the details thereof, State-wise; and

(c) the steps taken by the Government to revive sick factories and to rehabilitate the workers who were employed there?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND[#]PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) The Sugar mills in the country are grouped in three sectors namely, Public, Private and Cooperative. The sick sugar mills belonging to Private and Public sector are covered under the provisions of the Sick Industrial Companies (Special Provision) Act, 1985. According to BIFR, 42 sick sugar mills in Public and Private sectors have been registered with them as on 30.11.1999. Out of 42 sugar mills 4 mills were registered twice at different point of time. In view of that actually 38 sugar mills are registered with BIFR.

(c) As per the Sick Industrial Companies (Special Provision) Act. 1983 (SICA), where an industrial company has become sick, the Board of Directors of company shall within 60 days from the date of finalisation of audited accounts of the company for the financial year as at the end of which the company has become sick make a reference to BIFR for determination of measures which shall be adopted with respect to the company. As regards to rehabilitation of the workers who are employed in sick mills registered with BIFR, rehabilitation packages prepared by BIFR take care of the interest of the workers.

The Cooperative sugar factories are not covered under SICA. The functioning of cooperative sugar mills comes under the respective State Government. The State Governments should prepare suitable rehabilitation schemes for these sick units keeping the interest of the workers.

Prices of Essential Commodities

1141. SHRIG. PUTTA SWAMY GOWDA: Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state:

(a) whether the prices of essential commodities like vegetables, dal, fruits, bread, milk, edible oils etc. have increased enormously; and

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) The prices of essential commodities like vegetable, pulses, fruits, bread, milk and edible oils during the last one year have not shown any abnormal Increase. The trend in the Wholesale Price Index (WPI) numbers of these items over a period of one year ending 12.2.2000, as indicated below, shows that the prices either declined or moved up only marginally.

(b) The Government has taken a number of steps to control the prices and augment the availability of essential commodities in the country. Apart from certain long term measures to increase production of essential goods, imports of items which are in short supply, like pulses have been placed under OGL at zero per cent import duty. One lakh tonnes of different varieties of pulses have been imported on Government account to augment their availability in the country. Export of onion has been placed under quantitative restriction. Some of the essential commodities like rice, wheat, palmolein and kerosene are also supplied through the outlets of public distribution system at below market prices. Stringent actions are being taken against hoarders, black marketeers and others indulging in unfair trade practices under the Essential Commodities Act and Prevention of Black Marketing and Maintenance of Supplies of Essential Commodities Act by the State/UT Governments.

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND MINISTER OF CULTURE (SHRI ANANTH KUMAR) : (a) The allocation of funds for the maintenance, conservation, preservation and environmental development of monuments declared protected under Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Sites and Remains Act, 1958, during the last three years is as under:

The allocation for the current year is Rs. 8988.64 lakhs.

(b) The funds made available to the Archaeological Survey of India are not commensurate with its multifarious activities and responsibilities. The allocations made, are utilised for the maintenance, conservation and development of the protected monuments. (c) Various agencies such as the UNESCO, State Governments and its autonomous bodies have given funds for the conservation and development of specific monuments. Funds have also been received from the Corporate Sector for this purpose through the National Culture Fund.

Import of Rice

1143. SHRI RAMSAGAR RAWAT: Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state:

(a) whether the rice supplied under the PDS have 50 per cent and above broken rice and the same variety of rice when imported from Pakistan is cheaper and more lucrative to the traders who have flooded some of the markets in the country;

(b) whether traders in coastal States have been freely importing rice from Pakistan even when there has been a bumper harvest at home;

(c) the price at which the rice is being imported from Pakistan; and

(d) the price at which the same variety of rice is being sold in the country through the PDS?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI SHRIRAM CHAUHAN): (a) to (c) It is not possible to compare the quality and price of rice supplied under PDS and the rice imported by private traders from Pakistan, as the Uniform Specification of rice supplied under Public Distribution System (PDS) has less than 50% of broken rice.

As per the current Import and Export (EXIM) Policy, the import of common and coarse varieties of rice and rice with 50% or more brokens is freely allowed w.e.f. 27.5.97. There has been no import of rice from Pakistan during 1997-98 and 1998-99. However, during 1999-2000 as per information available so for, 1037 MTs. of rice valued at Rs. 83.75 lakhs has been imported from Pakistan by private traders as on 31.1.2000, which works out to approximately Rs. 808/-per quintal, on an average.

(d) The quality of rice imported from Pakistan and that supplied under PDS is not comparable. The prevailing Central Issue Prices of rice supplied under PDS are as under:

(c) to (e) During the last three years, 4 Naval aircrafts viz. two Kiran, one Sea Harrier and one Seaking have been lost in accidents resulting in death of one person.

All accidents are investigated by a Board of Inquiry. Based on the recommendations of the Board of Inquiry, directives for implementation of measures to prevent recurrence of accidents in future are issued by the Naval Head Quarters.

The projects from the State Nodal Implementing Agency/Organization are considered as and when received by the Ministry and financial assistance is provided based on the feasibility of the project and the availability of funds. The details of various projects undertaken for power generation from non-conventional energy sources in the State of Tamil Nadu are given in the Statement enclosed.

(c) and (d) The Ministry has proposed to set up a project of 0.5 MW power generation capacity utilizing taploca industry effluent and another project of 1.2 MW power generation capacity utilizing poultry droppings in the State of Tamil Nadu. These projects will involve central financial assistance of about Rs. 5.0 crores.

The recommendation was considered by the Committee of Secretaries and agreed in principle. Following the recent hijacking incident, it has been decided to deploy Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) at all operational domestic airports in the first phase. CISF has already taken over security duties at Patna, Jaipur, Guwahati, Vadodara and Port Blair airports.

Chartered Flights

As hutments are encroaching into the Canal at Tiruvallikeni station, the Tamilnadu Slum Clearance Board have been requested to remove the hutments and the work of clearing the construction debris, etc. at this station has been handed over to the State Government Public Works Department. For this purpose, an amount of Rs. 11.95 lakhs has been deposited on 23.7.98 with the Tamlinadu State Public Works Department.

In respect of emerging areas of potential private participation such as Commercial Utilisation of Railway land, marketing feasibility studies will be undertaken before taking up execution of identified works.

The Indian Railways Catering and Tourism Corporation has recently been set up which will formulate and market package tours in future.

Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government have considered the recommendations of the Mahajan High Powered Committee set up to study the laws and regulations governing the Sugar industry in the country;

(b) if so, the details of its recommendations alongwith the recommendations accepted by the Government;

(c) the reasons for not accepting the remaining recommendations thereof; and

(d) the time by which these recommendations are proposed to be implemented?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) and (b) The High Powered Committee under the Chairmanship of Shri B.B. Mahajan has given 141 recommendations on various aspects of sugar economy. The major recommendations of the Committee are as under :

- (i) Reservation of sugarcane area for mills should be on a permanent basis.
- Industrial licensing provisions should continue and the minimum distance between two sugar mills should be resorted to the previous level of 25 kms.
- (iii) Complete de-control of prices of sugar. Supply of sugar through PDS may be discontinued on expiry of two years. If the Government wishes to continue supply of sugar through PDS, it may purchase the required quantity from the industry or trade. Control on releases should continue even after complete decontrol of prices.

(iv) Sugarcane prices be determined by a Statutory Sugarcane Pricing Board.

2. Of the above major recommendations of the Committee, Government has, so far, taken the following decision.

- (i) Although the Mahajan Committee has recommended continuance of licensing policy with some modifications, Government has not agreed with the recommendations of the Mahajan Committee and has decided to delicense the sugar industry. Further, Government has also not agreed with the recommendations of the Mahajan Committee to increase the spatial distance between the two sugar units to 25 kms. and has decided that the present distance limit of 15 kms would continue to be observed.
- (ii) As regards decontrol of sugar, Government has decided to iower the levy obligation on domestic producers of sugar from 40% to 30% with effect from 1.1.2000.

(c) and (d) the remaining recommendations of the Committee are being processed in consultation with State Governments, Planning Commission and other concerned Departments of the Central Government and decision on them would be taken shortly.

(c) and (d) (i) In so far sugar is concerned, one nonspecific complaint about bad quality of sugar being imported was received. Since the matter came within the purview of Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, the same was forwarded to them. This Ministry has also requested Director General of Health Services to issue necessary instructions to the concerned Departments of State/UTAs to strictly enforce the provisions of Prevention of Food Adultration Act and its Rules in regard to imported sugar.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI SHRIRAM CHAUHAN) : (a) and (b) During the course of operation of Open Market Sale Scheme (Domestic) of wheat during 1996-97, some irregularities committed by FCI officials were noticed. Two cases were registered against them by State Police and in respect of others, departmental proceedings were initiated by FCI. A Statement showing Statistical data of cases registered against delinquent employees of FCI for irregularities in open sale of wheat (Domestic) scheme is enclosed.

(c) In pursuance of orders dated 25.7.97 of the Hon'ble High Court of Punjab and Haryana in P.I.L No. 915 of 1997, the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) in all, registered 13 (thirteen) cases viz. 6 in Haryana and 7 in Pubjab. Out of these, 3 cases are in progress, 3 closed, 3 recommended for action as deemed fit by FCI, 1 result awaited, 1 chargesheet framed in Punjab, 1 sanction awaited from Haryana Government for framing the chargesheet and 1 recommended for Departmental action. Action against the erring officials, as recommended by CBI, is in progress.

(d) Keeping in view the past experience of 1996-97, the open sale of wheat was undertaken as a Market Intervention Measures through selected State Governments/U.T.

Administration for the period January, 1998 to March, 1998. Again, in November, 1998, the Open Market Sale Scheme (Domestic) of wheat was undertaken through State Governments/U.T. Administration. However, due to record procurement of wheat by FCI and the procuring agencies for the Central Pool it was decided to release wheat under the ongoing Open Market Sale Scheme (Domestic) of wheat to all the users including the Roller Flour Mills and trader. District Manager, FCI will ensure that issue of stocks to the buyers is made on first-come-first served basis.

Expansion of Madurai Airport

1188. SHRI P. MOHAN : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether there is a demand from the trading and business community of Madurai to expand the Madurai Airport and convert in into an International Airport; and

(b) if so, the reaction of the Government thereto ?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) and (b) No, Sir. However, Airports Authority of India has plans for the construction of a new terminal building to cater to 400 passengers at a time and also extension of existing runway from 6000 ft. to 7500 ft.

Report of NIRD on Poverty

1189. SHRI A. BRAHMANAIAH : Will the Minister of RURAL DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state :

(a) whether the National Institute of Rural Development (NIRD) has given any report on the level of povery in the country;

(b) if so, the details thereof;

(c) whether NIRD has taken up any particular State for a deeper study; and

(d) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT (SHRI SUNDAR LAL PATWA): (a) and (b) The NIRD have brought out the 'India Rural Development Report-1999', in which the State-wise percentage of population below poverty line (as per the modified Expert Group, set-up by the Planning Commission) has been provided. As per the 1993-94 estimates, 37.27 per cent of the population is below the poverty line.

(c) and (d) NIRD has not taken up any particular State for study in the Report and has covered all the States, as also regions within States, for analysing the poverty situation.

Mumbai Rail Vikas Corporation

1190. SHRI SHIVAJI VITHALRAO KAMBLE : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government have reviewed recently the projects undertaken for implementation by Mumbai Rail Vikas Corporation (MRVC) during the current year;

(b) if so, the details thereof in terms of physical and financial targets set and achieved alongwith shortfall, if any, and reasons therefor;

(c) the details of financial and physical targets for the projects undertaken by the MRVC for 2000-2001; and

(d) the details of financial requirement for completion of the projects undertaken and financial assistance sought/ received/utilised so far from the international agencies?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) No, Sir.

(b) Does not arise.

(c) Mumbai Railway Vikas Corporation, (MRVC), a joint venture of Ministry of Railways and the Government of Maharashtra, has been set up under Ministry of Railways to execute rail projects included in the Mumbai Urban Transport Project (MUTP). A list of such project have been identified and these are to be taken up in two phases. Phase I projects are as under :

- 1. Santa Cruz- Borivali 5th line.
- 2. Kurla Thane 5th and 6th line.
- 3. Borivali-Bhayander quadrupling
- 4. Bhayander- Virar quadrupling
- 5. Western Railway Optimisation
- 6. Central Railway Optimisation
- 7. DC to AC conversion.
- 8. EMU Re manufacturing

Phase II projects are as under :

- 1. 5th line Kurla-CST
- 2. 6th line Borivali- Santa Cruz
- 3. 12 car local line on Western Railway
- 4. Harbour line optimisation
- 5. 12 car local line on Central Railway
- 6. New East West line

Execution of the projects in the two phases will overlap along with the Resettlement and Rehabilitation (R&R) of the Project Affected Persons (PAP).

Presently four of these projects are under execution. The details of these are as follows :

Physical targets of these projects will depend on the availability of funds, World Bank Loan and completion of Resettlement and Rehabilitation (R&R) of Project Affected Persons (PAP).

(d) The total cost of the projects identified is approximately Rs. 5000 Crores. The funding of these will be on 50 : 50 basis by Government of Maharashtra & Indian Railway. The World Bank has been approached by Indian Railways and the Government of Maharashtra for financial assistance and discussions in this regard are presently underway.

Inadequate Security Arrangements at Guwahati Airport

1191. SHRI BRAHMA NAND MANDAL : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether certain events at the Guwahati Airport have revealed inadequate security arrangements there:

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the steps taken by the Government to strengthen the security arrangements at airports?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) No, Sir.

(b) Does not arise.

(c) The following measures have been taken by the Government to strengthen security arrangements at airports :

- (i) Deployment of Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) personnel in place of the State Police for security duties at the operational airports in a phased manner. The CISF has already taken over the security duties at Patna, Jaipur, Guwahati, Vadodara and Port Blair airports.
- (ii) Frisking of passengers and hand baggage at the time of entry into sterile area has been tightened. Ladder point secondary frisking has been introduced.
- (iii) Strict control on access to the airports is being ensured on comprehensive review of photo-identity cards to restrict the number of pass holders and banning of entry of visitors upto 31.3.2000.
- (iv) Deployment of sky marshals on flights at random basis as an added safety precaution.
- (v) Raising of the perimeter wall to the prescribed height at all the operational airports.
- (vi) Replacement of old X mays machines and installation of new colour X-Ray machines wherever necessary so as to ensure that at least 2 X-ray machines are available at every point.

(vii) Modernisation and upgradation of security related technological set up at the airports is being done in a phased manner.

Internal Inquiry Report on Intelligence Failure

Reddy to carry out an overall appraisal of the Kargil operations. This has since been completed. The appraisal is not in the nature of an enquiry.

2. Such appraisals are part of an established practice in the Army and can be ordered by the formation commander with a view to draw lessons from an operation for the future.

3. The army has carried out an in-house review, subsequent to this appraisal.

KANNAPPAN) : (a) to (c) During 1997-98, for the first time, the Ministry identified ten regions in the country as High Focus Areas (HFA) for implementation of the Solar Photovoltaic Programme. The programme implementing State agencies were advised to implement at least 50% of the targets allocated to them for SPV systems like solar laterns, home lighting systems and street lighting systems in these High Focus Areas. Solar Photovoltaic power plants are not covered by this advice, as they are sanctioned on a case to case basis. Further, no targets were fixed for achievement by December, 1998; the targets are set for a full year.

The details of achievements in respect of solar lanterns, home lighting systems, street lighting systems, and power plants installed during 1998-99 in States having High Focus Areas are given in the Statement enclosed.

The outstanding against Badarpur Thermal Power Station and National Thermal Power Corporation have been shown separately as Badarpur Thermal Power Station is a separate organisation managed by National Thermal Power Corporation.

(b) Some of the measures taken to recover dues and prevent further accretion are as follows :

- (1) In order to stop fresh accrual of outstanding dues against all State Electricity Boards/Power Houses, the cabinet took a decision on 13-8-96 that movement of coal would be on 'prepayment' basis only. The decision was implemented for all State Electricity Boards/Power Houses w.e.f. 1-10-96 and in case of Badarpur Thermal Power Station and Delhi Vidyut Board w.e.f. 1-1-97. This measure has helped to reduce outstandings of several Power Houses, Badarpur Thermal Power Station which is unable to meet its monthly freight bill, and accounts for 68% of total outstanding against Power Houses as on 31-12-99.
- The matter regarding heavy outstanding dues (2) against State Electricity Boards/Power Houses was brought to the notice of the Cabinet. The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs, in its meeting held on 7/2/97 decided that the outstandings be adjusted by appropriation from Central Plan Assistance at the rate of 15% of the total outlay and distributed prorata to the Central Sector Undertakings who are owed money by Power Houses. This decision has helped Railways to realise Rs. 116.93 crores from Central Plan Assistance till December-1999. This includes recovery of Rs. 53 crores on account of Badarpur Thermal Power Station, and Rs.9 crores on account of National Thermal Power Corporation.
- (3) Meetings have been held with the officials of the concerned State Electricity Boards/ Power Houses from time to time.
- (4) Ministry of Railways has also approached Ministry of Power, Ministry of Finance and Govt. of NCT, Delhi at various levels including that of Minister of Railways.

SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) to (d) The duty on edible oils including soyabean oil which was 65% in April 1994 was progressively brought down to 30% in March 1995, 22% in March 97 and 15% in July, 1998 in lieu of steep increase in prices of oil in the domestic market. It was increased to 16.5% in March 1999.

(e) to (g) Government received representations from the trade and farmers that the heavy inflow of imported oil was affecting them. Government examined the representations and increased import duty of refined edible oils from 16.5% to 27.5% (including surcharge) with effect from 30.12.1999. While the import duty on crude vegetable oil has been maintained at 16.5%. it has been subjected to actual user condition so that only domestic processing industry can import such oils. The increase in duty has been effected with a view to helping the farmers to obtain better price for their produce as also to help the domestic oil seed processing industry to improve their capacity utilization and achieve greater value addition within the country.

- (ii) The UP Rural Water Supply and Environmental Sanitation Project costing US\$ 71.0 million and targeted to benefit 1000 villages in 19 districts of Uttar Pradesh has been undertaken with World

Bank assistance. The project implementation started in August, 1996 and is expected to be completed by May, 2002.

- (iii) The Karnataka Integrated Rural Water Supply and Environmental Sanitation Project with an estimated cost of US\$ 92.0 million and expected to cover 1113 villages in 16 districts of Karnataka has been undertaken with World Bank assistance. The project implementation started in 1993 and is expected to be completed in September, 2000.
- (iv) II Chennai Water Supply and Sanitation Project with an estimated cost of Rs. 657 crore has been undertaken with World Bank assistance. The project commenced on 20.11.95 and is expected to be completed by 30.06.2000.

(a) whether attention of the Government has been drawn to the news-item captioned "Pak, India agree to end unprovoked firing" as reported in 'Statesman' dated November 25, 1999;

(b) if so, whether any agreement with Pak authorities was held in the recent past to have a complete halt to unprovoked firings along the international border in J & K sector;

(c) if so, the details thereof; and

(d) the number of times when unprovoked firings noticed after the said agreement?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NANDES) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) and (c) During the bi-annual meeting between BSF and Pak Rangers held at Lahore in November, 1998, an agreement to halt unprovoked firing along the International Border in Jammu sector was made which was effectively implemented with effect from 23rd November, 1998. Many villagers near the border who had fled to other areas returned to their villages. But Pakistan again started this unprovoked firing, perhaps, in the wake of the Kargil conflict and this firing continued till November 1999 when the bi-annual meeting between BSF and Pak Rangers was held again at Lahore. This point was discussed in this meeting and it was agreed that unprovoked firing would not take place.

(d) Unprovoked firing from Pakistan continues. Effective and appropriate retaliatory fire is brought down on the Pakistani troops by our troops.

Purchase of Aircraft by Indian Airlines

1216. SHRIMATI SHYAMA SINGH : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether attention of the Government has been drawn to the Press news-item captioned "who will pay for new I.A. Aircraft" appearing in the Times of India dated January 26, 2000;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the reaction of the Government thereto?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) and (b) Yes, Sir. The main thrust of the news item was whether Indian Airlines would receive equity infusion of Rs. 325 crores in view of the decision of the Government to disinvest 51% of the equity in the Company.

(c) The Government's certain decision for equity infusion of Rs. 325 crores in Indian Airlines in the form of margin money for acquisition/replacement of aircraft was not reviewed.

KAN-NAPPAN) : (a) to (c) The Ministry of Non-Conventional Energy Sources has been implementing various programmes for generation of energy/power under Wind Power, Small Hydro Power, Biomass Power/Co-generation, Waste to Energy, Solar Photovoltaic etc., throughout the country including the State of Tamil Nadu. The Ministry encourages private sectors participation in generation of energy/power through various non-conventional energy sources and the projects under wind power, biomass/co-generation, small hydropower, energy from waste etc., are mostly in private sectors. The details of non-conventional energy generating projects installed and under installation in the State of Tamil Nadu are given in Statement enclosed.

Economical Viability of Electric and Diesel Locos

1218. SHRI ANNASAHEB M.K. PATIL : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) the relative merit of electrical power and diesel for locos in terms of cost effectiveness;

(b) the total consumption of diesel by Railways for the last three years, yearwise;

(c) whether the electricity driven locos are economical as compared to diesel driven locos; and

(d) if so, the steps taken/proposed to accelerate electrification of rail track to cut on operating cost drastically alongwith the details of action plan for 2000-01 and next five years?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) and (c) The cost effectiveness of a traction system depends on a number of variable factors such as traffic density of a section, grade, relative fuel/energy prices, capital involved, operational and maintenance costs etc. The relative economics of Diesel and Electric locos is worked out in the form of Traction Specific Line Haul Costs in Rupees per thousand gross tonne kilometres. The latest figures of 1997-98 are as under.

In some cases it is also justified for operational reasons. The execution of electrification is, however, subject to availability of funds. Proposal for Rural Sanitation Programme

1219. SHRI A. VENKATESH NAIK : Will the Minister of

RURAL DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state :

(a) whether the State Government of Karnataka has submitted any proposals seeking financial assistance for the implementation of Rural Sanitation Programme;

(b) if so, whether the State Government has also request to increase the existing amount of allocation for the purpose and also to provide subsidy of Rs. 2000/- per unit for families below poverty line for construction of individual household latrines; and

(c) if so, the present status of the proposals?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT (SHRI A. RAJA) : (a) Three project proposals for the districts of Bellary, Mysore and Mangalore (Dakshin Kannada) have been received during 1999-2000 from the Government of Karnataka for the implementation of the Total Sanitation Campaign (TSC) under the Rural Sanitation Programme. The proposals include construction of individual household latrines, sanitary complexes for women, school sanitation, drainage/garbage facilities, etc. The proposals have been approved for a total cost of about Rs. 10.02 crore for Bellary district, Rs. 11.14 crore for Mysore district and Rs. 6.38 crores for Mangalore (Dakshin Kannada) district. In addition to the above, about Rs. 4.61 crore has been released to the State Government under the "allocation based" component of the Rural Sanitation Programme.

(b) Yes, Sir.

(c) At present, there is no proposal to increase the subsidy rate for construction of individual household latrines to Rs. 2000/- per unit, as requested.

Viability of Sitapur-Burhwal-Gonda-Gorakhpur Rail Line

In order to facilitate smooth flow of traffic on this section, doubling of Burhwal-Gonda section has been taken up. Gauge conversion of Gonda-Gorakhpur Metre Gauge loop has also been sanctioned to provide an alternative to the already saturated section between Gonda and Gorakhpur.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI SHRIRAM CHAUHAN) : (a) to (e) The information is being collected and it will be laid on the table of the House.

(d) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND MINISTER OF CULTURE (SHRI ANANTH KUMAR) : (a) No, Sir.

(b) Question does not arise.

(c) and (d) The World Heritage Bureau of UNESCO has advised reformulation of the proposal in a revised format. Preparatory assistance is forthcoming from the UNESCO for this purpose.

Employment to Sports Persons in Railways

1223. SHRI AJAY SINGH CHAUTALA : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) the criteria and schemes to provide employment to sports persons on priority basis in Railways;

(b) the number of applications of sports persons received during the last three years and upto December, 1999 and the number of sports persons out of them was provided;

(c) the number of sports persons to whom employment is likely to be provided during 2000-2001; and

(d) the details of incentives given to sports persons?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) Sportspersons are recruited on the Indian Railways as per the norms laid down for the purpose. Such recruitments are done through Talent Scouting and Open Advertisements as per details given below :

- (i) Upto 30% of the quota in Group 'C' posts under Talent Scouting Scheme; and
- Upto 70% in Group 'C' and 100% in Group 'D' posts of the quota through Open Advertisement Scheme.

In the case of recruitment in Group 'C', sportspersons of International or National level for Group 'D' sportspersons of State level with creditable performance are eligible. (b) The information is being collected and will be laid on the Table of the Sabha.

(c) There is a provision for annual recruitment of approximately 1180 sportspersons both in Group 'C' and Group 'D' posts against the sports quota as per the limits prescribed for each Unit. However, the recruitment against these posts is subject to the availability of vacancies in the prescribed grade and availability of adequately proficient sportspersons in the desired game.

(d) The following incentives are given to the Railway sportspersons in recognition of their outstanding performance in National and International Meets :

- (i) Out of turn promotion;
- (ii) higher fixation of pay;
- (iii) additional increments;
- (iv) stipend through Rail Khel Ratna and Rail Khel Shri; and
- (v) Cash Awards.

Pak attacks on Indian Army Camps

1224. SHRI NARESH PUGLIA :

SHRI RAMJIVAN SINGH :

SHRI K. YERRANNAIDU :

Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state:

(a) the number of times the army camps and establishments in Jammu and Kashmir were attacked by the militants during the last three years till date;

(b) the number of Officers and Jawans of the Indian Army killed and injured in these attacks;

(c) the number of militants killed, injured and captured by the Army for attacking Army camps and establishments; and

(d) the measures taken for tight security of Army camps and Army establishments and installations in Jammu and Kashmir ?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NADES) : (a) to (d) Six physical attacks have been attempted by militants on Army/RR Camps in J&K. All 17 militants involved in these attacks have been killed.

Three officers, four junior commissioned officers and 19 Other Ranks have been killed and one officer and 35 Other Ranks have been wounded in these attacks.

Appropriate steps have been taken to prevent such attacks.

Flights to Dimapur from Kolcatta and Delhi

1225. SHRI K.A. SANGTAM : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government propose to start daily

flight on Kolcatta-Dimapur sector and Delhi-Dimapur flight for at least three days in a week specially during the peak seasons viz. May to July and October to December;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) if not, the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) to (c) At present, Dimapur is connected to Delhi via Calcutta through Alliance Air flights four times per week between Calcutta and Dimapur. Operators are free to operate on any route in their commercial judgement subject to compliance with the Route Dispersal Guidelines which provide for certain minimum operations on specified category of routes.

Deficiencies in Bullet-proof Jackets

1226. SHRI PRIYA RANJAN DASMUNSI : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether several soldiers and para-military personnel had been to hospital for lack of recoiling capacity of the bullet-proof jackets in the recent past;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the specifications prescribed for buying the bulletproof jackets for the soldiers and in what specification the Government have bought such bullet-proof jackets before and after the Kargil war ?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NANDES): (a) to (c) Army Headquarters have inimated that no data is available with them to indicate that hospitalisation of soldiers was due to lack of recoiling capacity of the bullet proof jackets. Ministry of Home Affairs have also confined that no such instances have been reported by the para-military forces.

The prescribed specifications for buying the bullet proof jackets are given in Statement enclosed. Procurement of bullet proof jackets before and after the Kargil war has been made as per the prescribed specifications.

Statement

Technical Specification

- The bullet proof jackets should conform to the Indian Army Technical standards. In addition, the equipment should conform to and US-NIJ standards 0101-03 (as revised from time to time). However, in case where different standards have been specified in performance specifications and the NIJ specification, the more stringent of the two will be considered.
- 2. Level of protection to be offered by the Hard Armour Plates and Soft armour Jacket material
 - a. The soft Armour Jacket material should provide protection to all ammunitions falling upto protection level III. A with reference to threat level table enclosed as Appendix 1 to his Annexure.







- b. From protection level III A upto level IIISP (similar to threat level posed by Dragunov) special Hard Armour Plate should be provided, which in conjunction with the Soft Armour Jacket provides total protection for ammunition falling in this range.
- Trauma Effect Trauma pads should be provided to absorb shock. The deformation depth should be reduced to minimum but should not exceed 20 mm in plasticine box at 20 degree C when tested as per NIJ standards.
- 4. The closing flaps should have velcro fastaners so that it can be worn and taken off quickly and easily.
- 5. Capability to detect repeated attack.

The HAP should be able to withstand seven bullet before it is completely shattered. The bullet should be absorbed and not recochat on striking the plate, irrespective of it being a fare or unfair shot.

- Service Life. Operational and maintenance should be simple and easy. Bullet Proof Jacket should not be adversely affected by storage under adverse climatic conditions normally met in the services. Services life should not be less than 10 Years.
- 7. Wearing confort and functionality.
 - (a) The bullet proof jacket shall conform the Drawing No. (P1 9010000 & P1 9020000) as at Annexure I. The BJP shall conform to the sample submitted by the venders and approved by the users for design, makeshape, dimensions, weights etc.
 - (c) The bullet jacket should be convenient and comfortable to wear and should not impede the movement of the wearer in carrying out various functions in field.
 - (d) It should have sufficient ventilation so that there is no-effect on the body after wearing for a prolonged time.
 - (e) The bullet jackets should be quick to wear with a fixed groin pad designed so as to allow easy folding and fastening or groin pad on the front portion of the jacket. Inspection/removal of the HAP should be quick and easy.
 - (f) Both shoulders should be capable of being opened and adjusted by means of velcro.
- Outer garment : The colour of the jacket should be that it can be camouflaged easily. The jacket should be in Indian camouflage pattern disruptive.
- 9. All the closing flaps of the jackets should have velcro fasteners so that it can be worn and taken

off easily and quickly.

- 10. Bullet Trapping : The HAP should be able to withstand seven bullets before it is completely shattered. The bullet should be absorbed and not recochet on sticking the plate, irrespective of it being a fair or unfair shot.
- 11. The HAP should be encased in a suitable material so as to completely arrest the splinters/fragments within the system on being hit by the bullet, irrespective of being a fair or unfair shot.
- 12. The details performance specifications of bullet proof are given at Annexure-II.

Annexure-II

Performance Specification : Bullet Proof Jackets

Part 1 : Operational Characteristics

General :

- 1. The Bullet Proof Jacket should be convenient and confortable to wear and should not impede the movement of the wearer in carrying out various functions in field.
- 2. Jacket parts :

The Bullet Proof jacket will consist of the following parts :

(a) Soft Armour Front and Rear

including collar

Jacket

- (b) Groin pad
- (c) Hard Armour Plate (9 HAP)
- (d) Trauma pad
- 3. Jacket : Soft Armour Front and Rear including collar and the groin pad will form the jacket.
- 4. Hard Armour Plat (HAP) : HAP SHOULD BE PROVIEDE SEPARATELY. Provision is made to add on the HAP in front of the jacket. Provision should also be made at the back of the jacket, to add on HAP, if required.
- Trauma pad for trauma Asttenuation : Trauma pad should be provided to absorb shock. The size of the trauma pad should correspond to the six of HAP. The deformation depth should be reduced to minimum, but should not exceed 20mm in plasticine block at 20 degree C.
- 6. Groin Pad : The Bullet Proof jackets should have the detachable groin pads. Provision should be made to fold the groin pad up and fasten its on to the front portion of the jacket with velcro fastener. The protection level provided by the groin pad should be same as per the rest of the jacket.

- 7. Collar/Neck pads : The jackets should have fixed collar/neck pads.
- 8. Pockets with flats : The jackets should be provided with two external pockets to house one 7.62 mm LMB magazine in the each and two external pockets to store one grenade 36 ht in each.
- Colour of the Jacket : The colour of the Jacket should be such that it can be camouflaged easily. The jackets should be in Indian camouflaged pattern disruptive only.
- 10. All the closing flaps of the jackets should have velcro fasteners so that it can be won and taken off easily and quickly.

Protection :

- 11. The HAP should as far as possible within constraints of its size specified in para 21, should cover vital parts of the body like heart, lungs, lever spleens, stomach and intensities which can cause fatal injuries.
- 12. The HAP should be encased in a suitable material so as to completely arrest the splendors/tragments within the system on being hit by the bullet, irrespective of being a fair or unfair shot.
- 13. The HAP should be encased in a suitable material so as to completely arrest the splinders/tragments within the system on being hit by the bullet, irrespective of being a fair or unfair shot.
- 14. The bullet proof jacket should be able to provide the following protection level :
 - (a) The HAP in conjuction with Soft Armour, should be able to stop the following at 50 metres :
 - (i) 7.62mm x 39 mm mild steel Core Amn of AK 47 and AK 56.
 - (ii) 7.62mm × 51mm NAIU Ball
 - (iii) 5.56mm 88-109/m-193 Lead Core Ammunition
 - (iv) 7.62mm × 51mm Indian Ball
 - (v) 7.62mm × 54mm Lead/mild steel Core Ammunition of Dragunov Rifle.
 - (b) The Soft Armour Jacket to include the collar and the groin pad should be able to stock the following at 5 meters :
 - (i) 9mm x 19mm (Supplier to specify type Parabellum of wpn/amn that should from SMC not be defeated)
 - (ii) 9mm Pistol (Supplier to specify type of wpn/amn that should not be defeated)
 - (iii) 12 bore Short Gun

15. The jacket (as defined in para 2) should provide a minimum protection area of 0.48 meters, for all sizes with adjustable velcros.

Waterproof packing

16. All parts of the bullet proof jackets should be encased in waterproof material.

Size And Shape

- 17. The Bullet proof Jackets should be provided in different sizes i.e. large and medium to suit Indian Physique.
- 18. The HAP should have a in low profile contour shape for snug fit.
- 19. Provision for bests straps for scientific distribution of weight of the jackets, so as to prevent injury to backbone.

Part II-Physical Characteristics

- 20. Weight
 - (a) Weight of the jacket as defined In para 3 above - not more than 2.5 kgs
 - (b) Weight of HAP not more than 2.6 kgs
 - (c) Weight of the Trauma pad - not more than 400 gms
 - (d) Total weight of the jacket complete - not more than 5.5 kgs
 - Note : If the trauma pad is incorporated in the HAP, then the weight of the HAP plus trauma pad should not exceed 3 kgs.
- 21. Size of HAP Not less than 750 sqcms (30 × 25 cms)
- 22. Service life : Operation and maintenance should be simple and easy. Bullet proof jackets should not be adversely affected by storage under adverse climatic conditions normally met in the services. Services life should not be less than 10 years.
- Temperature tolerance : The performance of the bullet proof jackets should not be affected adversely by temp variation from --50 degree C to +50 degree C and humidity levels of 95 percent at 40 degree C.
- 24. Outer cover of jacket should be washable.
- 25. A suitable maintenance manual should be issued for proper maintenance of the jacket.

Part III Misc

26. The equipment should conform to the Indian Army Teststandards. In Pridition, the equipment should conform to and the US-NLJ standard 0101-03 (as revised from time to time). However, in case where different standards have been specified in performance specifications and the NLJ specifications, the more stringent of the two will be considered.

- 27. Rear pocket to be provided to the jacket to cater for additional HAP. Six to facilitate easy slip in/ take out. Pocket to be waterproof.
- Adjustable belt made of broad elastic band is provided at the waist region to facilitate distribution of jacket load.
- 29. Length of shoulder and abdomen joints including velcro fasteners should be such as to enable personalised filament of jacket based on height and built of individual.
- 30. Outer jacket material to be made of denier urethane coated nylon coated nylon/other suitable material and should withstand regorous field usage. Cloth material should be waterproof.

Study on Economic Costs by FCI

1227. SHRI SUBODH MOHITE : Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government propose to study the 'economic costs' borne by the Food Corporation of India in procurement and distribution of foodgrains under the Public Distribution System; and

(b) if so, the details thereof ?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI SHRIRAM CHAUHAN) : (a) Yes Sir.

(b) The Administrative Staff College of India, Hyderabad has been engaged to study the cost of acquistion and distribution of Wheat and Rice by the Food Corporation of India, so as to arrive at ways and means for reducing the economic cost. The said agency has been asked to submit its report by June this Year.

D.R.D.O Projects Running behind Schedule

1228. SHRI PRABHUNATH SINGH :

SHRI SHEESH RAM SINGH RAVI :

Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether the DRDO is lagging much behind in developing some of the important equipments like Light Combat Aircraft, a multi barrel rocket launcher system, an AWACS type aircraft etc. and despite the assurance of Chief of the DRDO that the first prototype of LCA would fly in 1999, the LCA has not yet flown;

(b) the dates on which each of these projects was launched;

(c) the quantum of the projected amount at that time in each case and the extent to which it has been increased till now; and

(d) the reaction of the Government in this regard and the time by which each of the project is likely to be completed ?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FERNANDES) : (a) Despite best efforts, there have been delays in these projects due to a number of factors like : technology complexity, limitations of infrastructure, underestimation of time and cost as well as technology gaps.

(b) The Project Definition Phase of the LCA started in 1983 and the Full Scale Engineering Development Work in 1993. The project for the Multi-Barrel Rocket System (Pinaka) was initiated in December 1986. As for as the air borne radar surveillance is concerned, preliminary work was initiated for technology development related to some of the sub-systems; these activities were initiated in July 1985.

(c) Preliminary sanction for the LCA in 1983 was for Rs. 560 crores, at the 1982-83 price level. The sanction for Full Scale Engineering Development Phase-I in 1993 was Rs. 2188 crores. The sanctioned cost of Pinaka in Rs. 26.5 crores, which has been revised to Rs. 49 crores. A sum of Rs. 49 crores has been sanctioned in the area of airborne surveillance.

(d) According to present estimates, the maiden flight of the LCA is likely to occur in the first half of 2000. Usercum-troop trials of the Pinaka were conducted in October 1999 and productionisation would be taken up after acceptance by the Army. As far as AWACS is concerned Government is engaged in studies regarding various options.

Complaint Against Landing of Thackre'a Helicopter

1231. SHRI RAMDAS ATHAWALE : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether attention of the Government has been drawn to the news-item published in 'Jansatta', New Delhi dated January 18, 2000 under the caption "Thakre Ka helicopter uttarne ki shikayat darj karaigi nau sena"; (b) if so, whether any complaint has since been lodged;

(c) if so, the details thereof and the follow-up action taken thereon; and

(d) If not, the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NANDES) : (a) Yes, Sir. (b) to (d) An incident of unauthorised landing at Naval helipad, Uran by Dauphin helicopter with Registration marked VT-CKR carrying Mr. Bal Thackre occurred at 1217 Hrs. on 16th January 2000. On investigation of the incident, it was established that the pilot could not locate the airfield at Shirke and landed at the Naval helipad, Uran which was nearest to the Shirke airfield. The incident had occurred due to genuine pilot error and there was no malafide intention on the part of the pilot. As such, no follow up action was necessary

Measures to make Railways Profitable

1232. SHRI RAMSHETH THAKUR : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) has suggested several measures for making the Indian Railways more profitable and affectiveness;

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) to (d) In order to plan flow of investment from nontraditional sources of revenue, a Task Force was set up of which Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) was also one of the members. The Task Force has submitted the report recently and has made recommendations for generating investment from non-traditional sources like commercial utilisation of land and air-space, Own Your Wagon Scheme, Build Own Lease Transfer Scheme, Commercial Publicity, etc. The recommendations are under active consideration and decisions thereon will be taken shortly.

Construction of Godowns

1233. SHRI PAWAN KUMAR BANSAL : Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state :

(a) whether over a hundred persons had built godowns in Punjab for Food Corporation of India under a guarantee scheme over twenty years back;

(b) if so, the number of each godowns and their capacity with FCI at present;

(c) whether any revision in the rent of such godowns has been affected from time to time;

(d) if so, the details thereof and the rent paid for the Central Warehousing godowns as also of the open plinths; and

(e) the action taken thereon ?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI

SHRIRAM CHAUHAN) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) At present the Food Corporation of India has 165 such godowns with a total capacity of about 13.50 lakhs tonnes as on 1.2.2000 in the State of Punjab.

(c) to (e) As per the terms and conditions of the Agricultural Refinance Development Corporation (ARDC) Scheme, all such godowns were hired by the FCI, for a guaranteed period of five years with an option to extend it by another one year on the same terms and conditions. The rent ceilings of such godowns were fixed @40 paise and 50 paise per sq. ft. per month in Rural/Urban areas. After expiry of its guarantee period, all these godowns came under general hiring and the rents were fixed by the competent authority as per guidelines of Headquarters issued from time to time. Rent ceilings under general Hiring Scheme for the covered godowns as well as Covered Area and Plinths (CAP) were as under :

However Zonal Mangers of FCI have been delegated with full powers to decide the rentals of covered godowns of the private parties beyond the ceiling rates whereas for CAP (Plinths) storage these ceiling rates the maximum.

Storage charges that are payable to CWC include weighment charges, preservation, establishment charges and all other operations and hence are not comparable with the private capacities being hired and managed by FCI. The existing rate for CWC is RS. 2.10 per bag (95 kg) per month for covered godowns. The rates for CAP storage are decided mutually by CWC and FCI.

Pension to Soldiers of Second World War

1234. MAJ. GEN. (RETD.) B.C. KHANDURI : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government are aware of the pitiable condition of the vanishing tribe of Second World War veterans who were demobilised after Second World War without any pension;

(b) if so, whether the Government have made any effort to obtain information and data about these veterans;

(c) whether any monetary assistance is being provided to these veterans;

- (e) if not, the reasons therefor ?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NANDES) : (a) to (c) During the Second World War a large number of Indians were recruited in the British Indian Army for short periods ranging from 2 to 6 years. At the end of the war, these personnel were discharged with payment of service gratuity as full compensation for the service rendered by them. They are not eligible of pension as they had not put in requisite qualifying service. As per available information there are at present 99697 World War II veterans and 61917 widows. Such of these veterans and widows who have no other source of income are granted financial assistance upto Rs. 1000/- per month from the Raksha Mantri's Discretionary fund. Various State Governments also give financial assistance to the needy veterans as per statement enclosed.

(c) the time by which the new policy will be implemented ?

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND MINISTER OF CULTURE (SHRI ANANTH KUMAR) : (a) and (b) Yes, Sir. The new policy focuses on the following major items :

- (i) Providing Information, facilitation and safety to tourists.
- Creating awareness amongst all sections of society about the socio economic benefits of tourism.
- (iii) Providing a national focus for the development of tourism.
- (iv) Diversification of tourism products and its development.
- (v) Providing for peoples participation in the development of tourism and in sharing the benefits of tourism.
- (vi) Facilitating the development of a dynamic private sector in tourism industry.
- (vii) Ensuring easy international access to India, enhancing carrying capacity and improving the quality of services.
- (viii) Facilitating domestic tourism by promoting amenities and facilities for budget tourists.

(c) After the approval of the policy, the concerned Minister are expected to prepare their action plans within a period of two months.

Losses Incurred by Jamalpur Railway Workshop

1236. SHRI RAGHUNATH JHA : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Jamalpur Railway Workshop is Incorring heavy losses for the last three years; and

(b) if so, the details thereof and the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) Jarnalpur workshop is essentially an in-house servicing unit and incurs only expenditure. It has no earnings, being a "Cost Centre". The existing accounting system, therefore, does not bring out a "profit and loss statement". Hence, question of losses in this workshop does not arise.

(b) Does not arise.

Subsidy for Rural Sanitation

1237. SHRI G. PUTTA SWAMY GOWDA : Will the Minister of RURAL DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state :

(a) whether the State Government of Karnataka has requested the Union Government to release subsidy for rural sanitation;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the reaction of the Government thereto?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT (SHRI A. RAJA) : (a) to (c) Three project proposals for the districts of Bellary, Mysore and Mangalore (Dakshin Kannada) have been received during 1999-2000 from the Government of Karnataka for the implementation of the Total Sanitation Campaign (TSC) under the Rural Sanitation Programme. The proposals include construction of individual household latrines, sanitary complexes for women, school sanitation, drainage/garbage facilities, etc. The proposals have been approved for a total cost of about Rs. 10.02 crore for Bellary district, Rs. 11.14 crore for Mysore district and Rs. 6.38 crore for Mangalore (Dakshin Kannada) district. First instalment of 30% of the Central Government share has already been released. In addition to the above, about Rs. 4.61 crore has also been released to the State Government under the "allocation based" component of the Rural Sanitation Programme.

Perks of Field Marshal

1238. SHRI CHANDRA VIJAY SINGH : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether the post and rank of Field Marshal exists in the Army;

- (b) if so, the present incumbent holding this post;
- (c) whether the Government are adhering to the set

norms in granting the holder of such rank adequate privileges and dignities; and

(d) if not, the reasons therefor ?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FERNANDES) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) The present incumbent holding the rank of Field Marshal is Field Marshal SHFJ Manekshaw, MC.

(c) and (d) All ceremonial privileges and monetary entitlements as per norms have been extended to him.

HAL Airport

1239. SHRI MOHAN RAWALE : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether HAL Airport in Bangalore is a Defence airport;

(b) if so, whether the airport's security is vulnerable as one can enter the airport through Bellandur lake or even by jumping the boundary walls; and

(c) if so, the steps taken/proposed to be taken to ensure security of this primport ?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE (SHRI HARIN PATHAK) : (a) The Airport in question belongs to Hindustan Aeronautics Limited, a Public Sector Undertaking under the Ministry of Defence and is used by various organisations under the Ministry of Defence as well as for civil flights.

(b) and (c) Adequate security measures have been taken. There is a 10 feet high perimeter wall with barbed wire, all around the aerodrome including the side facing the Bellandur lake. The enclosed area is patrolled by security personnel round the ciock along a track inside the perimeter wall. The entry and exit points are manned by security personnel. The civil aircraft apron, the various terminal bulkdings, and the air traffic control stations are also guarded.

Expansion of Activities of NIRD

1240. SHRI A. BRAHMANAIAH : Will the Minister of RURAL DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state :

(a) whether any efforts have been made to expand the activities of National Institute of Rural Development located in Andhra Pradesh;

(b) if so, whether any camps have been held in different parts of the country to train Panchayati Raj elected officials;

(c) if so, the details thereof; and

(d) the extent to which the NIRD has been able to identify problems in the existing working of local Panchayatl Raj Institutions?

THE MINISTER OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT (SHRI SUNDAR LAL PATWA): (a) The NIRD has striven to expand

its training and research activities in different areas and has set up Specialised Centres, in addition to developing a close network with the various State Institutes of Rural Development. The Institute has upgraded computer facilities by establishing Local Area Network and Computerised Library Information Cell.

At present, Action Research Projects are under operation in different States viz. Andhra Pradesh, Kerala, Maharashtra, Orissa, Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu. Besides, public information kiosks have also been established on a pilot basis to provide information to the rural people. In order to keep the elected representatives informed of the developments across the States, a monthly news letter "PANCHAYAT UNNATI" has been started and circulated amongst 2.3 lakh Panchayati Raj bodies across the country.

(b) The NIRD has been organizing off-campus training programmes for the elected representives, as well as the official functionaries of Panchayati Raj Institutions in various parts of the country, primarily through the State Institutes of Rural Development, in addition to its regular training programmes at headquarters.

(c) On an average, the Institute conducts 120-130 training programmes per year, including off- campus programmes organised in different parts of the country.

(d) A comprehensive 'Patterns of Decentralised Govemance in Rural India' on the working of Panchayati Raj Institutions in 19 major States had examined the working of the Panchayati Raj system in various States. Panchayati Raj being a State subject, different States have location specific/ State specific operational problems, particularly with regard to the devolution of functions and funds, as well as transferring different departments, institutions and functionaries to the Panchayati Raj Institutions.

Train Accident at Koucheguda

1241. PROF. UMMAREDDY VENKATESWARLU : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether a number of people were injured by a running train at Koucheguda Railway Station on February 7, 2000;

(b) if so, the details thereof and the assistance provided to the injured;

(c) whether any inquiry has been conducted in this regard; and

(d) if so, the outcome thereof and action taken thereon?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) and (b) Yes, Sir. On 6.2.2000, 12 persons were hit and injured by a suburban train at Kacheguda railway station when they were crossing the railway track from platform no. 1 to platform no. 3. Out of the 12 persons injured, one person died on the spot and 3 others succumbed to the injuries in the hospital. Railway doctors attended on the injured, rendered first aid and shifted

them to the Osmania Government Hospital, Hyderabad. All possible help and assistance was given to the injured and family members who were accompanying them. The General Manager of South Central Railway himself visited the Hospital to ensure adequate care and attention to the injured. Railway doctors are visiting the hospital daily and monitoring the condition of two persons who are still undergoing treatment.

(c) and (d) Yes, Sir. A Committee of Railway officials conducted an inquiry into the incident and concluded that the incident occurred on account of trespass on the railway track by the victims.

Development of Tourism in Andaman and Nicobar

1242. SHRI VIJAY GOEL : Will the Minister of TOURISM be pleased to state :

(a) whether an attractive tourist location like the Andaman & Nicobar Islands is proposed to be given any major facelifit; and

(b) if so, the amount budgeted and spent during the past three years?

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND MINISTER OF CULTURE (SHRI ANANTH KUMAR) : (a) and (b) The development of tourist places is primarily undertaken by the State Government/Union Territory concerned. However, Ministry of Tourism provides Central financial assistance for Tourism Projects in consultation with the State/UT concerned every year. During the last three years Rs. 164.50 lakhs were sanctioned for various projects and Rs. 50.50 lakhs were released as 1st instalment.

Helicopter Service for Vaishno Devi and Badrinath (UP)

(a) the date by when the helicopter services for Vaishno Devi (Jammu) and Badrinath (U.P.) is likely to commence;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) if not, the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) to (c) The Pawan Hans Helicopters Limited (PHHL) plans to operate helicopter services on Jammu-Sanjichhat-Jammu and Katra-Sanjichhat-Katra Sectors. The services shall commence as soon as necessary clearances for air safety/security, etc. are issued by the concerned authorities.

Garhwal Mandal Vikas Nigam Limited (GMVNL) had proposed helicopter services ex-Rudraprayag to Badrinath-Kedarnath for which the PHHL had offered a five seater helicopter on wet lease. The reaction of GMVNL is awaited.

Parcel booking

1244. DR. SANJAY PASWAN : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether attention of the Government has been drawn to the news-items captioned "Parcel Booking Lease Par Dene Se Railway Ko Karoroan Ka Nuksaan" appearing in Jansatta dated January 11, 2000;

- (b) if so, the facts reported therein; and
- (c) the reaction of the Government thereto?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) and (b) Yes, Sir. The news report contains allegations that the scheme for leasing of space in break vans (SLRs) is causing losses to the Railways because the contractors are committing irregularities like overloading, carriage of banned/contraband commodities etc.

The scheme for leasing of SLR space was (C) introduced in 1992-93 to give guaranteed clearance and better quality of service to the customers besides maximising the loading of parcel traffic and earnings therefrom. Based on the experience, it was observed that parcel earnings were not growing in real terms. A revised scheme was announced in February' 1999 Rail Budget as per which the front SLRs of all Mail/Express/Superfast/Passenger/Shatabdi/Rajdhani trains can be leased out. Open tenders are invited to lease out SLR space in identified trains and the contract is awarded to the highest bidder to ensure maximum revenue to the Railways. Thus, there is no question of any loss being caused to the Railways by this scheme. This is established by the fact that during the current year so far, there has been an increase of more than 20% in parcel earnings as compared to corresponding period of last year vis-a-vis increase of only 5.2% and 8.8% respectively over two successive previous years.

In order to prevent irregularities by lease-holders like overloading, carriage of banned/contraband commodities etc., surprise checks are being conducted at regular intervals and appropriate follow-up action as necessary is taken. Further, in order to avoid any hardship to the general customers, the rear SLR kept under the charge of the train Guard is available for booking and clearance of normal traffic.

Pakistani Vessel Apprehended by Coast Guard

1245. SHRI DINSHA PATEL : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether some Pakistani vessels have recently been apprehended by the Indian Coast Guard or Navy off the sensitive Lakshadweep Coast;

(b) if so, the details of each of such incidents during each of the last three years along with the country to which they belong; (c) whether the Pak vessels were carrying ISI agents too:

(d) if so, the facts of the case; and

(e) the steps taken by the Government to step up vigilance along the coast line including Gujarat?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NANDES): (a) and (b) Coast Guard has apprehended four Pakistani vessels along with 49 persons on 12.2.2000 in the area off the Lakshadweep Group of islands. The apprehended vessels and persons were escorted to Marmagao Port and handed over to local police.

In the preceeding three years (January 1997 to December 1999), 13 boats with 64 crew members were apprehended in the Lakshadweep islands. The details are as under :

(e) Indian Navy along with Coast Guard conducts regular surveillance operations of the coast as also in the island territories of Andaman & Nicobar islands and Lakshadweep. Enhanced vigilance along the Gujarat Coast is also being maintained.

The ship is to be constructed by M/s Cochin Shipyard Limited, Cochin for which a letter of intent has been issued in May 1999. The design specifications of the ship are being finalised.

INS Virat has not been decommissioned. Only INS Vikrant has been decommissioned. The construction of an air defence ship has already been approved by the Government in replacement of INS 'Vikrant'.

Indian Railways had Imported 1 No. 4000 Horse Power Diesel Electric Freight Locomotive in 1999-2000. However, earlier 20 High Horse Power Freight Diesel Locomotives (12 fully assembled and 8 Partially Knocked Down (PKD) were received In the last week of March 1999. The PKD Locomotives are being Assembled and Commissioned during 1999-2000.

(b) and (c) An order for 10 Nos. 4000 Horse Power Diesel Electric Passenger Locomotives has been placed on M/s General Motors Corporation, USA on 20.1.1999. The delivery of these locomotives is to be completed by May 2001.

(d) The performance of imported diesel and electric locomotives is satisfactory and the number of diesel and electric locomotives not working due to manufacturing defects is nil.

(e) Does not arise.

(f) Indian Railways have entered into a transfer of technology contract for manufacture of 4000 HP diesel locomotives at Diesel Locomotive Works, Varanasi and for manufacture of 6000 HP Electric locomotives at Chittaranjan Locomotive Works, Chittaranjan.

(b) and (c) It has been made mandatory w.e.f. 1st January, 1999 to instal Airborne Collision Avoidance System (ACAS)-II in all aircraft having certified seating capacity of more than 30 or a payload capacity of more than 3 tonnes operating in Indian airspace. Aeroplane having certified seating capacity of 10 to 30 or payload capacity of 1 to 3 tonnes have been required to instal ACAS-I upto 31.12.2003.

(d) Does not arise.

Impose of Levy on Imported Sugar

(b) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) and (b) Government has issued necessary orders dated 17.02.2000 imposing 30% levy obligation on importers of sugar.

Airport Tax at IGI Airport

1253. SHRI RAVI PRAKASH VERMA : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether airport tax of Rs. 500/- is being collected from each passenger every time at the Indira Gandhi International Airport;

(b) if so, the average daily collection made on this account; and

(c) the amount spent out of the collection made for the improvement of civic amenities at the Indira Gandhi International Airport?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) Yes, Sir. Rs. 500/- as Foreign Travel Tax is collected from each embarking international passenger.

(b) Average daily collection during 1998-99 was Rs. 23.93 lakhs.

(c) The amount so collected is credited to the consolidated fund of India with only 10% share being paid to the Airports Authority of India (AAI). AAI has spent an amount of Rs. 54.50 crores during 1998-99 towards improvement and maintenance of the passenger facilities at the Indira Gandhi International Airport as a whole.

Conversion of Purna Satellite Diesel Shed

1254. SHRI SURESH RAMRAO JADHAV : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether any request has been received for conversion of Purna Satellite Diesel Shed Into Diesel Home Shed in South Central Railway;

(b) if so, the reaction of the Government on the request; and

(c) the steps taken by the Government to make available all the facilities for repair of Diesel Engines at Purna?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) and (c) The demand for conversion of satellite diesel shed to full-fledged diesel shed at Purna has not been considered justified from the operational point of view as establishment of diesel shed has to take into account traffic flow pattern and other operational considerations besides the existing diesel sheds.

Border Violations by China

1255. SHRI AJAY SINGH CHAUTALA : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government are aware that the violations of Line of Control on Indian border is committed by China time and again;

(b) if so, the details of such violations committed during the last three years;

(c) whether the Government have contemplated any methodological preparations to deal with the war-like situation with China; and

(d) if not, the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NANDES) : (a) to (d) The resolution of the boundary between India and China is outstanding. Further, the two sides have differences in perception of the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in the areas along the border. Both sides carry out patrolling activities in the border areas as per their respective perception sof the LAC. Whenever an increase in the concerned activities along the border, including violations of the LAC, is observed, the matter is taken up through diplomatic channels and also through Border Personnel Meetings/Flag Meetings. Suitable measures continue to be taken to meet any situation. Presently, there is no tension along the India-China border.

2. The two sides have been discussing the boundary question in the frame work of a Joint Working Group. Both India and China have reiterated their desire to seek a fair, reasonable and mutually acceptable settlement for the boundary question through dialogue. Also, both the countries have reiterated their commitment to respect the Agreement on Maintenance of Peace and Tranquillity along the LAC in the India-China Border Areas (1993) and the Agreement on Confidence Building Measures in the Military Field along the LAC in the India-China Border Areas (1996) which provide an institutional framework for the maintenance of peace and tranquility in the border of the two countries.

3. Government keeps a constant vigil on our borders and monitors all developments having a bearing on our national security. All necessary measures are taken to maintain defence preparedness. Phalguna 12, 1921 (Saka)

Judicial Proble into Gaisal Train Accident

(a) whether the judicial probe into the Gaisal railway tragedy, occurred on 2nd August, 1999 has since begun;

(b) if so, the details thereof;

(c) the time by which the report of the said judicial commission is likely to be received; and

(d) if not, the reasons for delay in starting the proble?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) The Judicial Commision headed by Justice G.N. Ray was constituted by the Government of India by a notification dated 20.01.1999. The Commission visited accident site and nearby railway stations twice during November, 1999. After examining details collected by the Chief Commissioner of Railway Safety, examination of witnesses has commenced from 16.02.2000.

(c) There is no mention of target date in the notification issued for constituting the Commission. However, Commission has been advised to submit its report within the shortest possible time keepting in view the nature of the tragedy.

(d) There was no delay in commencing the enquiry.

Gauge Conversion of Rangiya-Tezpur-Murkong Selek Rail Line

1257. SHRI M.K. SUBBA : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether the survey for guage conversion of Rangiya-Tezpur-Bhulukpong-Murkong Selek rail line has been completed:

(b) if so, the further action taken by the Government thereon;

(c) if not, the reasons for delay; and

(d) the time by which the conversion work on above line is likely to be started and completed?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) to (d) Survey for conversion of sub-section Rangia-Bhalukpong has been completed and for sub-sections Balipara to Murkongselek and Rangpara North-Tezpur, survey is still in progress. Further consideration of the project would be possible once the survey reports become available.

Solar Cookers and Solar Heaters

1258. SHRI BRAJA KOSHORE TRIPATHY : Will the

Minister of NON-CONVENTIONAL ENERGY SOURCES be pleased to state :

(a) whether good percentage of solar cookers, solar heaters etc. once installed became non-functional;

(b) if so, the details thereof;

(c) the money spent by the Government commensurate with the benefit reaped and conventional energy saved; and

(d) the details of money spent during the year 1998-99 and budget provisions made for the year 1999-2000?

THE MINISTER OF STATE OF THE MINISTRY OF NON-CONVENTIONAL ENERGY SOURCES (SHRI M. KANNAPPAN) : (a) and (b) A large number of solar cookers and solar water heaters installed during the eighties became non-functional due to the factors such as evolving nature of technology, lack of maintenance and lack of interest on the part of users. However, the situation has improved greatly during the past few years due to better technology, introduction of standards, improved after sales service etc. A recent survey by the Consumer Coordination Council in Bangalore found that 97% of the solar water heaters installed during the last five years were functional.

(c) The money spent by the Government helped in the development of a manufacturing base in the country, improvement in the technology and products, and building consumer confidence. The investment on a solar water heater is recovered in 3-6 years depending on the fuel substituted; that on a cooker in 3-4 years. These factors have led to a commercialization of these products, enabling the Government to discontinue the capital subsidy on them.

(d) The money spent by the Central Government during the year 1998-99 for the development and promotion of solar cookers, solar water heaters and other solar thermal devices was Rs. 1.45 crores. The budget provision for the year 1999-2000 is Rs. 3.50 crores.

Land Mismanagement

1259. SHRI PRABHUNATH SINGH :

SHRI RAGHUNATH JHA :

Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether attention of the Government has been invited to the news item captioned "CAG" slams Rlys. Board for not adopting right track on land management" appearing in 'The Indian Express' dated December 13, 1999;

(b) if so, the facts reported therein together with the reaction thereof;

(c) the number of agreements that have been executed by the Railways during the last three years and the current year so far and revenue collected therefrom; and

(d) the reasons for slow progress and the steps taken to bring about improvement therein?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) Yes, Sir.

- (b) The Report mainly contains the following :
- Staff not provided exclusively for Land Management work on Zonal Railways as well as in Railway Board;
- Work of certification of land plans not complete, land records not being maintained as expected, large number of encroachments and Court cases;
- (iii) The execution of agreements and recovery of licence fee not up to the mark;
- (iv) Earnings from afforestation on vacant land were very dismal.

The position regarding these points is given below :

(i) to (iii) Though the need for strengthening of Land Management Organisation in Railways has been felt and acknowledged over the years, the staff could not be provided exclusively for Land Management work due to ba.n - on creation of parts and resource crunch. Due to this, staff had to look after the other duties in addition to the work related to land management work. However, the activities of the Land Management Organisation especially those connected with commercial exploitation of Railways land and air space are being entrusted to the Railways PSUs as the Railway is not in a position to increase the staff.

(iv) Afforestation on railway land, till now was being taken up mainly from the point of view of protection of railway land from encroachments and to improve the environment. However, in pursuant to the recommendation of the Expert Committee on Land Management on Indian Railways, Ministry of Railways have now decided to take up plantation of trees on railway land on commercial lines as well.

(c) and (d) The information is being collected and will be laid on the Table of the Sabha.

F.C.I. Godowns in Tamil Nadu

1260. SHRI P.D. ELANGOVAN : Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state :

(a) the godowns and offices and Food Corporation of India at present in Tamil Nadu, location-wise;

(b) the expenditure incurred by F.C.I. on procurement, storage and distribution of rice, grains, wheat etc. in Tamil Nadu during each of the last three years;

(c) whether the Government has taken any measures to improve the existing open-air godowns in the country, particularly in Tamil Nadu; and

(d) if so, the steps taken by the Government to increase the storag potential?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI SHRIRAM CHAUHAN) : (a) At present the Food Corporation of India has a total of 42 godowns (35 covered and 7 Covered Area and Plinths (CAP) in the State of Tamil Nadu.

A statement showing location-wise FCI Godowns and FCI Offices in Tamil Nadu is enclosed.

(b) The FCI do not procure foodgrains in Tamil Nadu. It stores foodgrains received from other States and issue the same to the Tamil Nadu Government as per PDS allocation given by the Government and other consumers. Distribution cost on quantity issued under TPDS Scheme in Tamil Nadu is as under :

(c) and (d) Procurement of rice in Tamil Nadu is done by the State agencies under monopoly procurement scheme under which the FCI is prohibited from procuring. The State agencies are accordingly responsible for providing godowns for the paddy/rice procured by them. The Tamil Nadu Government has not intimated any problem regarding inadequacy of godown/storage facility. A sum of Rs. 50 lakhs was given to Tamil Nadu Government in 1996-97 for constructing 18 godowns to create additional capacity of 2480 Metric Tons. The Tamil Nadu Government have not yet constructed these godowns.

The existing storage capacity with the FCI (owned and hired) in Tamil Nadu is considered adequate for buffer stocking and public distribution.

The CAP storage in Tamil Nadu and elesewhere in the country are considered a temporary requirement to store excessive stocks of wheat held by FCI and the State/State agencies all over the country. They are perfectly safe and scientific storages involving lesser storage costs. Permanent capacities however, would be created wherever the need for creation of addition capacities is established over a period of time. The capacity is proposed to be increased by participation of private/public agencies. Statement

Security at Jammu Airport

1261. SHRI RAMDAS ATHAWALE : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether attention of the Government have been drawn to the news item captioned "Jammu Hawai Adde Par Bhi Paryapt Suraksha Vyavastha Nahi" appearing in 'Navbharat Times' dated December 28, 1999;

- (b) if so, the details thereof; and
- (c) the reaction of the Government thereto?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) In the said news item it has been alleged that due to lax security arrangements at Jammu there is a possibility that some unauthorised person may be able to enter the airport in connivance with tour operators and local officials.

(c) Security arrangements at all airports including lammu airport are constantly reviewed at different levels. After the recent incident of hijacking, following measures have been taken to beef up of security arrangements at the airports :

- (i) Deployment of Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) personnel in place of State Police for security duties at the operational airports in a phased manner. The CISF has already taken over the security duties at Patna, Jaipur, Guwahati, Vadodara and Port Blair airports.
- (ii) Frisking of passengers and hand baggage at the

time of entry into sterile area has been tightened. Ladder point secondary frisking has been introduced.

- (iii) Strict control on access to the airports is being ensured by comprehensive review of photo-identity cards to restrict the number of pass holders and banning of entry of the visitors upto 31.3.2000.
- (iv) Deployment of sky marshals of flights at random basis as an added safety precaution.
- (v) Raising of the perimeter wall to the prescribed height at all the operational airports.
- (vi) Replacement of old X-Ray machines and installation of new colour X-Ray machines wherever necessary so as to ensure that at least 2 X-Ray machines are available at svory point.
- (vii) Modernisation and upgradation of security related technological set up at the airports is being done in a phased manner.

(c) There is no provision in the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Sites and Remains Act 1958 to declare any city as a heritage city.

Railway Network in Madhya Pradesh

1264. SHRI SATYAVRAT CHATURVEDI : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether the rail network is scant in Madhya Pradesh in comparison to other States;

(b) if so, the details in this regard on the basis of the survey for 100 square miles; and

(c) the steps being taken by the Government in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) and (b) No, Sir. According to the latest available data as on 31.3.1999, the State of Madhya Pradesh ranks second in railway route kilometres (first being Uttar Pradesh) amongst all other States. Out of a total route kilometres of 62,809 for all Indian Railways, the share of Madhya Pradesh is 5,922 kms. (9.43%). Moreover, the route kilometres serving Madhya Pradesh per lakh of population is 8.94 vis-a-vis 7.42 on all India basis.

(c) In order to further strengthen the rail infrastructure in the State, construction of new lines from Lalitpur-Satna-Rewa-Singrauli, Guna-Etawah, Bishrampur-Ambikapur, Godhra-Indore-Dewas-Maksi and DallIrajahara-Jagdalpur, Ramganjmandi-Bhopal have been sanctioned. Gauge conversion of Jabalpur-Gondia and Neemuch-Ratlam section have also been taken up.

Tourist arrivals during the month of December, 1999 recorded an increase of over 2.9% over the corresponding period of the previous year.

(c) The Ministry of Tourism In collaboration with State Governments/Union Territories have identified certain events to attract foreign tourists during the year 2000 such as, Explore India in the Millennium Year Celebrations, Khajuraho Millennium Celebrations, Special visit India promotions during the Summer and Monsoon period, Special campaign to attract Non-Resident Indians and Persons of Indian origin.

Storage of Foodgrains in F.C.I. Godowns

1267. SHRI RAGHUNATH JHA : Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state :

(a) whether attention of the Government has been drawn to the news item captioned "CAG finds alarming shortage of grain, F.C.I. doesn't accept" appearing in the 'Indian Express' dated February 13, 2000;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the action taken and proposed to be taken by the Government in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI SHRIRAM CHAUHAN) : (a) Yes, Sir. (b) There have been discrepancies in the figures of stocks of foodgrains in central pool as maintained by the Ministry of Consumer Affairs and Public Distribution and those maintained by Food Corporation of India (FCI). As per direction of the Cabinet Committee on Prices (CCP), the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (C&AG) carried out special audit of the stocks of foodgrains held by FCI and pointed out a (-) variance of 4.74 lakh tonnes between the stocks of foodgrains as per book balance of FCI as on 31.3.97 and the stocks worked out by the surveyors appointed by C&AG as on that date. FCI has not accepted the variance of stocks of foodgrains as pointed out by C&AG in its audit report because of a different method, viz. volumetric method adopted by C&AG while conducting the special audit.

(c) The Ministry has examined the C&AG audit report and the objections of FCI on the report and has asked FCI to investigate the causes of shortages in those godowns where shortages were pointed out by C&AG.

Manufacturing of Army Vehicles by Jabalpur Vehicle Factory

1268. SHRIMATI JAYASHREE BANERJEE : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether Jabalpur vehicle factory does not have orders for manufacturing army vehicles in accordance with its capacity;

(b) if so, the reasons therefor;

(c) whether the army had placed an urgent order for supply of certain vehicles in 1999; and

(d) if so, the reasons as to why this order was subsequently shifted to Ashok Leyland and Tata Udyog?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE (SHRI HARIN PATHAK) : (a) to (d) Vehicle Factory, Jabalpur has been given orders for 5862 of 2.5 ton LPTA 713 and 5/7.5 Ton Stallion Mk III vehicles during 1999-2000. These are new products, the manufacturing technology of which is being gradually absorbed. The production capacity for these vehicles would be firmed up in about 3 years. No quantity out of the above orders has been shifted from Vehicle Factory, Jabalpur to Ashok Leyland or Telco.

2. Since Army had huge deficiency of vehicles in 2.5 Ton and 5/7.5 Ton category vehicles, they placed direct orders in March 1999 on Telco and M/s Ashok Leyland for 1,000 vehicles each to reduce the deficiency.

Import of Soyabean

1269. SHRI MADHAVRAO SCINDIA: Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state:

(a) the decision taken to protect the Interests of Soya Bean producers who had been badly hit by cheap imports of Soya Bean earlier during the current year and the damage to Soya Bean crops by heavy rains, especially those in Madhya Pradesh;

(b) if so, the total quantum of Soya Bean and Soya Bean oil imported during the current year and the cost of their imports; and

(c) the production of these items and their annual consumption and requirement in the country, State-wise?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) There has been no import of soyabean seed in the last three years. Even so, the Government has taken the following decisions to protect the interests of the soyabean producers:

- (i) The duty on import of oilseeds including soyabean seed has been kept at the highest level of 40%.
- MSP of Soyabean (Yellow) has been raised from Rs. 795/- per quintal (during 1998-99) to Rs. 845/- per quintal in the current year.
- With effect from 30.12.1999, the import duty on refined oils has been raised from 16.5% to 27.5%. While the import duty on crude soyabean oil has remained at 16.5%, its import has been subject to "actual user" condition. One of the important objectives has been to help the farmers in terms of better realisation of their produce.
- (iv) NAFED has been alerted to undertake market support operations as and when situation demands.

(b) As already indicated, there has been no import of soyabean in the last three years including the current year. The total quantum and value of soyabean oil imported under OGL, in the current year (Nov., 1999 to Jan., 2000) has been approximately 1.18 lakh tonnes around Rs. 190 crores.

(c) The production of soyabean seed and soyabean oil in 1999-2000 is estimated to be 65.2 lakh MT and 10.4 lakh MT respectively. The entire production is consumed within the country. State-wise figures are not available.

During 1999-2000, over 600 projects have been prioritised for development of tourism in consultation with the State/UT Governments. 21 Travel Circuits, 12 Destinations and 5 Special Tourism Areas have been identified for development in the various parts of the country.

(b) One hundred forty nine project proposals have been sanctioned during the last three years upto 15.2.2000.

(c) The total area likely to be covered under these sanctioned projects is given State-wise in the Statement-I.

(d) and (e) The Department of Land Resources in the Ministry of Rural Development has finalised priority lists (State-wise) of the IWD project proposals in consultation with the State Governments for sanction during the current financial year. The details of the pending prioritized project proposals with the Department for sanction, State-wise are given in the Statement-II.

Sanction of the IWD Project proposals depends upon their viability, conformity with the Guidelines for Watershed Development and availability of funds for the scheme. Hence, it is difficult to indicate any specific date for the sanction of the prioritized projects.

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Bharat Darshan Theme Parks

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND MINISTER OF CULTURE (SHRI ANANTH KUMAR) : (a) to (c) An important aspect of the celebrations of the Golden Jubilee of the Republic would be creation of assets and promotion and dissemination of our rich cultural heritage. Towards this end, Govt. have decided, in principle, to set up "Bharat Darshan" Science/Culture Parks, to showcase our cultural heritage, promote science education and project our scientific achievements. The concept is in the process of elaboration.

Black Box for Trains

1273. SHRI NARESH PUGLIA: Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state:

(a) whether a 'black box' has been developed for Railways to determine the cause of disastrous train accidents;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the time by which this system is likely to fitted in trains?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) No, Sir. In Railways, a black box device on the pattern of airlines does not exist.

In air transportation, the pilot of an aeroplane is given verbal orders by the air traffic controller. As such recording of such information is useful in case of an accident for ascertaining the cause of an accident.

In Railways, the train driver is guided by aspect of signals that he encounters and other documents as may be given to him and not by any verbal orders. Moreover, the speed recorder graph in the locomotive gives an indication of the speed of the train when it met with an accident. In view of this Black Box for trains is not considered useful.

(b) and (c) Do not arise.

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NANDES : (a) to (d) The proposal to acquire WLRs for the Army predates the Kargil conflict. There are several aspects of the proposal which are currently under consideration. Based on an intimation from a German supplier, being part of a consortium, that their WLR system was not available for evaluation by the technical team being under maintenance schedule, the visit had been postponed. Recently, the supplier has informed that their system is, now available for the purpose of evaluation in Germany.

Involvement of agents/middlemen in the procurement of Weapon systems/Armaments is banned as per the instructions issued by the Government in 1989. A specific clause to this effect is included in the Contracts which clearly stipulates that no agent can be engaged by the supplier and no agency commission in any from can be paid by him. This clause, also, inter alia provides that if, at a subsequent date, it is detected that an agent was engaged by the supplier, the Contract would be liable to cancellation in addition to debarment of the firm for 5 years from having any dealing with Minisry of Defence.

Contingency Plan for Scheduled Flights

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) and (b) Yes, Sir. A detailed contingency plan has been formulated for safe operation of flights by augmentation of manpower through induction of Indian Air Force (IAF) and retired Airports Authority of India (AAI) Air Traffic Controllers to handle the Air Traffic Control services. In Phase-I of the plan, operation of flights overflying Indian aerospace, international and domestic flights from Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai and Calcutta will be provided. In Phase-II, flights operating from domestic airports will be provided.

(c) to (e) Yes, Sir. The Committee consisted of representatives from Directorate General of Civil Aviation, Indian Airlines and Airports Authority of India has submitted its report in December, 1999.

1283. SHRI RAMJEE MANJHI : Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state :

(a) whether the rates of same quality items are higher at National Co-operative Consumer Federation in comparison to that of at Kendriya Bhandar; (b) if so, the reasons therefor; and

(c) whether the Government propose to bring the rates at par of same quality at NCCF and Kendriya Bhandar?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) and (b) The NCCF and Kendriya Bhandar have independent pricing policies dependent on different business factors. As such the rates of several items may differ in both the organizations.

(c) In view of the above, there is no such proposal under consideration of the Government.

Flights not allowed to Land at Palam and IGI Airport

1248. SHRI SUSHIL KUMAR SHINDE : Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state :

(a) whether a large number of air-flights were not allowed to land at Palam airport and Indira Gandhi International Airport, in Delhi and a number of flights were also cancelled due to fog during the last three months;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the losses suffered on this account to different airlines and the airport authorities?

THE MINISTER OF CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI SHARAD YADAV) : (a) to (c) The information is being collected and will be laid on the table of the House.

Train Accident

1285. SHRI SUDESH RAMRAO JADHAV : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether a repeat of the last years Gaisal accidents narrowly averted on January 24, 2000 when the driver of the Guwahati bound Rajdhani Express brought it to a screeching halt barely a couple of hundred yards away from the stationary Awadh-Assam Express bound for New Delhi:

(b) if so, whether any inquiry has been made into this incident;

(c) if so, the details thereof; and

(d) the action taken against those found responsible for it?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH): (a) No, Sir. The facts of the case are that on 24.01.2000, after starting from Kumedpur Station, the driver of 2436 Up Rajdhani Express noticed that his train started going towards the down line on which he was not supposed to go, he brought his train to a halt Immediately within the station section. At that time 5609 Dn Awadh-Assam Express was at Khurial Station more than 7 Kms from Kumedmpur on account of its locomotive having failed.

(b) and (c) Yes, Sir. A Departmental inquiry consisting

of Senior Administrative Officers has been conducted into the above incident. The Inquiry committee has concluded that the incidence occurred due to failure of interlocking of signals and failure of staff. Possibility of outside interference to failure of interlocking is being investigated by civil police.

(d) The staff involved have been taken up for lack of alertness due to which the above situation was created.

Declaration of Hit, Kill, Run War by Pak

1268. SHRI VILAS MUTTEMWAR : Will the Minister of DEFENCE be pleased to state :

(a) whether attention of the Government has been drawn to the news-item appearing in the Asian Age dated January 15, 2000 under the caption "Pakistan declares hit, kill, run war":

(b) if so, whether the terrorists who have launched well planned offensive in J&K are trained in high altitude warfare and have access to sophisticated arms;

(c) whether the Srinagar is the main target and terrorists receive cash for successful targets and compensation for their families in case of death; and

(d) if so, the remedial steps proposed to be taken in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI GEORGE FER-NANDES) : (a) to (d) Government are aware of the news report referred to in part (a) of the Question.

- 2. It is well known that the terrorists have access to sophisticated weapons like AK rifles, machine guns, rocket launchers, missiles, mortars etc. There are also reports to the effect that the terrorists are being imparted training in Pakistan occupied Kashmir on survival, commando techniques and fighting in extreme cold weather conditions. The terrorists are reportedly rewarded for their subversive activities undertaken in J&K. Reports also indicate that compensation is paid to the families of terrorists killed.
- 3. The terrorists operate in several areas in J&K. Srinagar had become the focus of terrorist activities in winter months. However, the terrorists have clearly lost their initiative in the face of onslaught by the security forces. The situation is constantly monitored and effective measures are being taken by the security forces to foil the evil designs of the terrorists and their supporters and sponsors.

Misutilisation of Fund under Rural Development Schemes

1287. SHRI SULTAN SALAHUDDIN OWAISI : Will the Minister of RURAL DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government are aware of the irregu-

larities committed in selection of projects under Employment Assurance Scheme, Jawahar Rozgar Yojana and Jawahar Gramin Samridhi Yojana during the year 1998-99 and 1999-2000 in Bihar in viclation of the directives laid down by the Government;

(b) if so, the details thereof; and

(c) the steps taken by the Union Government in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT (SHRI SUNDAR LAL PATWA) : (a) to (c) No complaints regarding irregularities committed in selection of projects under Employment Assurance Scheme (EAS) and Jawahar Rozgar Yojana (JRY) (now Jawahar Gram Samridhi Yojana) in Bihar during 1998-99 and 1999-2000 have been received by this Ministry. However, the Ministry has developed a comprehensive system of monitoring. Vigilance and Monitoring Committees have also been set up at State, District and Block levels to monitor implementation of the programmes.

Export of Sugar

1288. SHRI AJAY SINGH CHAUTALA :

SHRI T.T.V. DHINAKARAN :

Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleaed to state :

(a) whether the Government are contemplating on export of sugar;

(b) if so, the quantity and the rate of exported sugar, country-wise; and

(c) the scheme/programme being formulated by the Government to enhance sugar production in sugar producing areas alongwith the proposed financial assistance to be given to each State for this purpose during 2000-2001?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) and (b) Due to low level of prices prevailing in the international market, the export of sugar is not economically. However, export of sugar against preferential quotas of EEC & USA and a small quantity of sugar to Nepal under bi-lateral Indo-Nepal Treaty of Trade is being undertaken.

(c) Government of India is providing financial assistance to the sugar mills from Sugar Development Fund (SDF) on soft terms for their sugarcane development and Modernisation/Rehabilitation schemes. As on 31.12.1999,

the amounts of Rs. 414.33 crores for cane-development in 611 cases and Rs. 889.93 crores for modernisation in 206 cases have been disbursed form Sugar Development Fund.

Sugar Development Fund

1289. SHRI NAWAL KISHORE RAI :

SHRI SUKDEO PASWAN :

Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state :

(a) whether 820 crore of rupees were deposited in the Sugar Development Fund upto September, 1999;

(b) whether any sugar mills have applied for grants out of this fund;

(c) if so, the details thereof and the amount sanctioned to sugar mills. State-wise and mill-wise; and

(d) the time by which the amount is likely to be sanctioned alongwith the reasons for delay in releasing the amount to the remaining sugar mills?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) During the period from 1982-83 to 1999-2000 (upto 30-9-99) an amount of Rs. 2366.00 crores had been transferred to the Sugar Development Fund and after disbursal/repayment of loans an amount of Rs. 982.78 crores was available in the Fund as on 30-9-99.

(b) to (d) The rules governing SDF provide for making (i) loans to sugar unit for modernisation/rehabilitation (ii) for cane development (iii) payment of buffer subsidy (iv) for giving assistance as grants-in-aid to established inititutions for carrying out research aimed at promotion and development of any aspect of sugar industry and (v) defraying other expenses for development of sugar industry. The details of loans, grants and buffer subsidy sanctioned and disbursed to sugar units since inception of SDF and upto 31-12-99 is given in the statement enclosed. So for, among the sugar factories, grant-in-aid has been applied for and sanctioned to :

1. M/s Simbhaoli Sugar Mills Ltd., Simbhaoli, District Ghaziabad (U.P.) for implementation of scheme titled "Management of Sugarcane Borers". An amount of Rs. 45.48 lakhs was sanctioned to the Sugar Mill in July, 1988, and

2. M/s Shirpur Shetkari SSK Ltd., Shirpur, District Dhule (Maharashtra) for implementation of scheme titled "Establishment of a pilot plant for fortification of Vitamin A". An amount of Rs. 43.50 lakhs was sanctioned to the Sugar Mill In August, 1999.

(a) whether a huge amount of arrears of sugarcane is lying outstanding against Sugar Mill owners in the country;

(b) if so, the details thereof as on January 1, 2000 sugar mill-wise in each State;

(c) the efforts made by the Government to accelerate the payment of amount to farmers ?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI V. SREENIVASA PRASAD) : (a) and (b) As per information received from the Sugar Mills as on 01.01.2000 (opening), the total amount of sugar cane growers, dues against the sugar mills for the sugar season 1999-2000 (October-September) was Rs. 707.39 crores. Sugar mill-wise details are given in the statement enclosed. The position of cane price dues for the current 1999-2000 vis-a-vis previous two seasons as on 1st Junuary (Opening) is given as under :

Thus the dues are not abnormal during the current crushing season.

(c) The responsibility for ensuring timely payment of cane price dues to the farmers by the sugar mills lies with the State Governments who have necessary powers and field agencies to ensure such payments. The Central Government on its part has been drawing the attention of the State Governments to the provisions of the Sugar Cane (Control) Order 1966 including payment of interest in the case of delay beyond 15 days and they are being advised at the highest level from time to time to expedite clearance of cane price arrears. Central Government has also been pursuing a policy of encouraging stability and reasonable level of sugar prices in the domestic market through judicious release of free sale sugar quotas to enable the sugar factories to clear the cane price dues of the farmers.

Development of Rail Corridor between Singapore and Europe via India

1291. SHRI ANNASAHEB M.K. PATIL : Wil the Minister RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Government are examining the feasibility of developing Railway corridor between Singapore and Europe via India;

(b) if so, whether any Committee has been set up for this purpose;

(c) if so, the details thereof;

(d) whether neighbouring countries have been contacted in this regard; and

(e) if so, the reaction of these countries thereto?

THE MIISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAIL-WAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) to (e) The proposal for developing a Railway Corridor linking Europe/CIS countries and Singapore/South East Asian countries via India is being pursued under the aegis of International Union of Railways (UIC), Paris and UN-ESCAP, Bangkok. UN-ESCAP has submitted a report on the Network Identification and other related issues of the Southern Corridor of the Trans-Asain Railway from Kunming in China/Bangkok in Thailand to Kapikule (Bulgaria)/CIS countries. The report is under examination by the member countries.

Under UIC, a Corridor Task Force has been set up headed by Chairman, Railway Board, India in connection with the setting up of the South East Asia- West Asia Rail Corridor from Singapore to Turkey/CIS Countries via India. Ministry of Railways has also been trying with UIC and UN-ESCAP to pool their efforts and resources for a synergistic approach on the project.

Neighboring countries have been involved in multilateral fora, both at UN-ESCAP's Expert Group Meeting at Dhaka in May' 99 and in the on-going initiative by UIC's Corridor Task Force. They have supported the initiative in principle, and their definite views on alignment and on the technical matters are being coordinated by UN-ESCAP and UIC respectively.

Release of Sugar in Open Market

1292. SHRI G. PUTTA SWAMY GOWDA : Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBU-TION be pleased to state:

(a) whether the Government of Karnataka had sought the permission from the Union Government to release the sugar stocks worth Rs.450 crores to the market lying in various sugar mills; and

(b) if so, the action, if any, taken by the Union Government in this regard?

Additional free-sale quotas have been allocated to the sugar factories of the State of Karnataka from time to time as per the prescribed guidelines.

Compensation for Transportation of Essential

Commodities

1293. PROF. UMMAREDDY VENKATESWARLU : Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state :

(a) whether the Railways have sought any compensation for carrying essential commodities at lower rates and for transporting freight to the North-East at subsidised rates;

(b) if so, the estimate thereof; and

(c) the loss suffered by Railways annually thereby?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI DIGVIJAY SINGH) : (a) to (c) Yes, Sir. Compensation has been sought for carrying certain essential commodities at rates lower than the cost of operation. Such commodities include salt, fruits and vegetables, provisions etc. In addition, compensation is also being sought for freight traffic moved to and from the North-East region at subsidised rates.

(b) The basis for protection of any monument or site under the Archaeological Survey of India is a study of its archaeological, architectural and historical merit. This kind of study and selection of monuments and sites for protection is an ongoing process.

(c) During the last three years (1997-98 to 1999-2000) Archaeological Survey of India conducted excavation at 55 sites. Information about them has not been published in languages other than in English. Besides, archaeological studies have been conducted at 9 places, information regarding one of them, i.e. Mattenchery Palace, Dist. Ernakulam, Kerala has been published in Malayalam language. Epigraphical survey and study has been conducted at twenty three places.
