THE MINISTER OF INFORMATION AND BROADCASTING AND MINISTER OF PARLIAMENTARY AFFAIRS (SHRI P. UPENDRA): Sir, I warmly congratulate you on your unanimous election as the Speaker. We have known each other for several years

and perhaps, we share the same ideological background, if not of the same brand.

Sir, as the Minister for Parliamentary Affairs and as the Government's Chief Whip, I assure you full cooperation from this side. I am sure you will be able to run the House smoothly with your sober manners coupled with your firmness.

I particularly thank the Leader of the Opposition, hon. Shri Rajiv Gandhiji, for facilitating your unanimous election today. It is a good augury. I am sure this atmosphere of goodwill will continue and the House will run smoothly in the true democratic traditions.

I would not like to introduce any element of controversy now which might mar the solemnity of the occasion and the atmosphere of goodwill here. But I would like to set the record straight. Therefore, I presumed that the opposition had no particular choice in the matter and they would like to facilitate the unanimous election of a person chosen by this side. Therefore, I observed the propriety of informing him of our choice before filing the nomination. I do not think we have committed any impropriety. But I can assure you that the process of consultation will be much more than was obtaining hitherto. I can assure him that on all important matters, I will take him into confidence and I will seek his cooperation.

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MR. SPEAKER: With the permission of the House. I would like to say a few words first in Hindi and thereafter in English.

I thank you all for the signal honour you have done me by electing me to this high office unanimously. I shall try to discharge the duties of this noble office with humility and absolute impartiality. I assure the members that I shall keep away from all involvement in party politics as long I hold this office. I shall also try to uphold the high standards laid down by my eminent predecessors.

May I take this opportunity to assure you that as the mouthpiece and the servant of this House, I will speak only one language and that is the language of the House. I am sure that I shall have your wholehearted goodwill, co-operation and guidance in conducting the deliberations so that the House is able to fulfil the trust that our supreme masters, the people of India have reposed in us.

We are the world's largest democracy and the whole world is watching us with keen interest. The recent elections have once again proved the inner vitality and strength of our democracy and our people's unflinching faith in democratic values. I am sure we shall prove ourselves worthy of the faith the electorate has reposed in us.

We must all remember that this House is the highest representative panchayat of the 750 million common people of India. As such, it must not only reflect the hopes, urges and aspirations of the common people but also their frustrations and sorrows.

We should never forget that the Lok Sabha is a forum for orderly debate. Through speech we must argue and persuade. The cut and thrust of debate is the very essence of parliamentary proceedings. I have always held the view that the Lok Sabha, as the nation's sentinel, must have the opportuni-

ties to discuss all the issues that exercise the mind of the people.

To quote my illustrious predecessor Shri G.V. Mavalankar:

"The Legislatures are substantially deliberative bodies and representative of the people; they consider, discuss or debate the general lines on which they would like the Government of the country to run, and they have also authority to make laws for the purpose-They are intended in a sense for effecting a peaceful and gradual evolution, or if you so like to call it, a revolution in the society and in the Government—For real democracy, one has, therefore, to look not merely in the provisions of the Constitution, or the rules and regulations made for the conduct of business in the Legislatures, but one has to foster a real democratic spirit in those who form the Legislature".

It shall be my endeavour to give all parties and individual members opportunities to raise issues of vital public importance to the nation in general and to their constituents in particular. My only request to you all is that you should cooperate with me in conducting the deliberations in an orderly manner.

Parliamentary procedure is not an immutable thing. It is a means to a great end. If necessary, we can have a fresh look at some of our rules and regulations. Our Rules Committee can go into this matter with a view to ensuring speedy, smooth and effective transaction of business.

A beginning has been made in the matter of setting up standing Parliamentary Subject Committees to constantly and concurrently scrutinise the work of, and examine the legislative proposals emanating from, the Departments of Environment and Forests, Agriculture and Science and Technology. If the experiment proves to be satisfactory and if you all agree, it can also be extended to

other departments. This innovation will make the principle of continuing accountability of the Executive to the Lok Sabha a reality.
