SHRI DASARATHA DEB (Tripura East): Mr. Chairman, Sir, yesterday I was narrating how American imperialism, which revealed itself as the enemy of the Indian people only a few months back, is now attempting to subjugate another part of Asia. It is a matter of great shame that for years the Government of India, which were heavily depending on American loans. would not condemn American aggression in Vietnam. The Government of India have so far followed a policy of relying on foreign aid, particularly US aid. Their policy regarding the Provisional Revolutionary Government is still more regrettable. Even today there is a tendency on the part of the Government of India to equate the puppet Government in Saigon with the Provisional Revolutionary Government established by the people in South Vietnam. This is totally wrong. This is a damaging attitude which is indirectly helping the American imperialists to cover up the American aggressive design against the freedom-loving people of Vietnam.

Our party has always been demanding that India should recognise the Provisional Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam and sever its diplomatic relations with the Saigon Government. But I am sorry to note that the Government of India is still hesiting to take positive steps in this direction.
